Tina Calo honored as Volunteer of the Quarter

When AOSHS board selected Tina Calo for the Volunteer of the Quarter award in 2002, she seemed puzzled as to why she had received it. Her only "job" for AOSHS had been to maintain the listing of deceased educators-a fairly passive job. Tina was recognized by AOSHS because she was always there at every reunion, coming to the AOSHS table asking, "How can I help?" She would always sign up for several hours of working at the table, taking memberships or selling T-shirts.



In 2002 when we reorganized the board structure and were looking for someone to handle membership full-time, Tina's name was the first to come to mind. I knew she would be dependable, dedicated to the task and great to work with-and it all proved true.

As the new computer membership program was developed, Tina made suggestions to improve the program to meet our needs. As we worked together over my three years as president, several unusual situations arose, but we were always able to come up with a reasonable solution, and Tina could always handle the task. Tina is the kind of member every organization hopes for.

Tina's career with DoDDS began in 1967 when she left for Okinawa, thinking she was going to teach second grade. But to her surprise, she and three others started the elementary guidance program on the island. She transferred to Berlin in 1970 where she spent one year before returning to the United States for the special teacher exchange program in Washington, DC. Following DC, Tina taught at Hahn AF Base for seven years. She then returned to the US for a year of study at Sacramento State to become special education certified. Her last years in DoDDS were spent at Rhein Main AB and Myrtle Beach AF Base. She retired from DoDDS in 1995.

Congratulations, Tina, and many thanks for your continued support of AOSHS.



A Message from the DoDDS-Pacific/DDESS-Guam Director: DoDDS 60th Anniversary

The Department of Defense Education Activity (DoDDS) officially marks its 60th Anniversary in the overseas areas during the 2006/2007 School Year. What can we be proud of as we celebrate this important anniversary? Because of the dedication of our teachers and administrative support team, we provide quality education to the

24,000 plus students enrolled in our 45 schools across Guam, Japan, Korea, and Okinawa.

We can be proud of 60 years... supporting America's military families. As educators, we have learned from past conflicts and deployments that schools are one of the most important quality of life factors affecting military readiness and success. When military service members have confidence in our ability to take care of their children, bey are better able to fulfill their mission. Our schools continue operating in a normal fashion, ensuring the safety of our students in a stable and supportive environment.

We can also be proud of providing quality education for our students for 60 years. Our students consistently score very well on standardized tests as compared to their stateside counterparts. Our students also continue to do well after they leave our school system. We have DoDEA Alumni who have become world famous celebrities, athletes, captains of industry, senior ranking military officers, teachers, artists, and most importantly, successful family members in a global economy. The students who attend our schools will be the future policy makers, doctors, teachers, engineers, and community members that reach out and make a difference.

What will the next 60 years be like for our system? Our principals and teachers have the potential to impact the course of our organization through the work they do with students, parents, and community members. The most important component of our success for the next 60 years is the people who make up the DoDDS-Pacific/DDESS-Guam schools – our administrators, teachers, curriculum

specialists, contractors, parents, and volunteers who provide our students with the best educational opportunities both inside and outside the classroom. You all are my heroes!

For those of you new to our organization you may find the following information of interest.

DoDDS was established following World War II. At the end of the war, there was no precedent to follow for establishing and operating dependents schools in foreign occupied countries - quite often, parents organized small schools. In the Pacific the first schools that were opened were the Meguro School and the Johnson Army Air Base School located in the Tokyo area. The first schools were privately supported through carnivals and benefit drives conducted by the local school board authorities. Tuition fees were assessed with Enlisted Men paying \$2.00 and Officers paying \$4.00 per month. Most of the teachers were dependent wives. All of these schools came under the operational control of the 8th Army Troop Information and Education Section and were under the overall supervision of General MacArthur. The director of all dependents schools in the Pacific and the man most instrumental in their development was Dr. Robert Patin, a former superintendent of Ohio. The oldest school continuously in existence since 1946 is the Yokota Elementary School.

Housing for the early schools varied greatly. Many were located in Quonset huts, but the Bluff School in Yokohama was located in a Japanese Girls Commercial School and the Nagoya School was temporarily located in Nagoya Public Hall and later in the Mitsui Bussan Building. Still later, the Matthew C. Perry School at Iwaukuni inherited the most interesting assortment of buildings,

to include a commissary, a chapel, and Officer's Club Snack Bar Annex. left over by an Australian contingent of the Occupied Forces. A few of the first schools in Japan operated under policies and procedures of the State of (Continued on page 6)

of California; others were established under the methods prescribed by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. In 1950, Dr. Patin announced that all 12 Far East Command High Schools in Japan, Okinawa, and the Philippines had received NCA accreditation. This was a major step forward. Dr. Patin was the first Far East representative of the NCA, and we continue to maintain a very close relationship with NCA today.

The schools in Japan operated under the local common tri-service superintendent system until 1964, when the worldwide dependents schools operation came under control of the Assistant Secretary of Defense for Manpower. The first Area Office was established in 1964. Under the Area Director school districts were established in 1964, with district superintendents assigned who reported directly to the Area Director. Japan and Korea were initially combined as District 1 and Okinawa was established as District II in 1965. In 1966 the schools in Korea became a separate district; however, the schools returned to District 1 again in 1971.

During the 1960s and 1970s, worldwide enrollment in DoDDS averaged 160,000. In 1976 a Joint House-Senate Conference Committee Report informed the three military departments that the Department of Defense was taking over the operation of the military dependents schools. established office in the Pentagon - the Office of Overseas Dependents Education, responsible to the Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense for Manpower and Reserve Affairs - took oversight of the schools. In 1979, the Office of Overseas Dependents Education became the Department of Defense Dependent Schools. The three geographic areas (Europe, Atlantic, and Pacific) were reconfigured into six geographic regions (Atlantic, Germany North, Germany South, Mediterranean, Panama, and Pacific); each with a Regional Director and several district superintendents. In the early 1980s the Germany North and Germany South regions were combined into a single Germany region.

Following the end of the Cold War, the number of DoDDS schools in Europe was reduced and DoDDS combined with the U.S.-based Domestic Dependent Elementary and Secondary Schools (DDESS) to form the Department of Defense Education Activity (DoDEA).

To our organization, and the next 60 years, let us never lose sight of our rich history and remain committed to the children and military families we serve

Today, DoDEA operates more than 218 public schools in 14 districts located in seven U.S. states, Puerto Rico, Guam and 12 foreign countries to serve the children of mili-



tary service members and Department of Defense civilian employees. All schools within DoDEA are fully accredited by U.S. accreditation agencies. Some 90,000 students are enrolled in DoDEA schools, with approximately 63,000 students in the DoDDS system and approximately 25,000 students in the DDESS system. DoDDS employs approximately 6,200 instructional personnel, and DDESS employs approximately 2,900.

FIRST ANNOUNCEMENT

G.D. (ROBERT) WILLIAMS 1931-2006

G. D. was born in Florida, went to local schools and, after high school, entered the University of Florida in Gainsville. In January 1951, after the first semester of his sophomore year, he enlisted in the U.S. Army with the 11th Airborne Division. While in the Army he was given the nickname of G.D.(Gordon Dewey) as there were several other men in his unit named Robert. He was honorably discharged in 1954, returned to the University of Florida and graduated with a BA in Education. In the summer of 1957 he entered the American University and over the next three years earned an MA in Economics, received his teaching certificate, and completed his student teaching.

G.D. joined DODDS in 1960 and taught in Japan, Spain, Turkey, Germany, England, and the Philippines. While in Japan he met and married his wife Fuki and adopted her daughter Ann. Their daughter Flora was born in 1968.

When G.D. was in the Army, he learned to skydive and truly enjoyed it so during his second assignment in the Philippines, he joined the skydiving club at Clark AFB. For many years, at Christmas, Santa arrived at Clark by parachute – thanks to G.D.

G.D. retired from DODDS in 1987 and settled in New Orleans where he continued his interests of fishing, poker, classical music, history, watching professional wrestling and skydiving. He was killed July 22, 2006 in a fatal skydiving accident while making his 2255th jump. Those who knew him were constantly surprised by his perception, so often revealed by a quiet sense of humor.

TOM GAHAN 1933 – 2006

Tom grew up in Tacoma, Washington where he and his siblings would play in the great forest behind their home. He swam across Lake Washington and climbed Mount Rainier. In school, he was active in sports, speech, drama, and served both as valedictorian and president of his class.

His education continued with Masters' Degrees in English, Philosophy, and Library Science. He was fluent in French and German and read Greek and Latin. He spent ten years in the Jesuit Order before following his brother Larry into DoDDS. There he taught in Europe and Turkey and his deep love of books and music and his knowledge and enthusiasm inspired his students in literature and history. Subsequent assignments found him in the Philippines and Korea as a librarian. While in the Philippines, his greatest adventure was the adoption of his three sons, Roger, Richard, and Diego.

Tom has been described as "a warm, sensitive, caring individual" with "a lively sense of humor". Family members saw a man of great courage as he dealt with Parkinson's disease.

JOAN MAC DONALD 1926 – 2006

Joan was born in Dedham, Massachusetts, grew up in Boston and attended the public schools there. She studied at the University of New Hampshire for two years and then transferred to Simmons College in Massachusetts, graduating with a major in English. She earned a Master's Degree from Boston University and did post graduate work in Speech at Emerson College.

Joan's overseas career was in Panama, Puerto Rico, Okinawa, the Philippines, and Korea. Joan was reassigned to Japan when Mt. Pinatubo erupted in the Philippines but was able to take advantage of the opportunity to return to Subic Bay Naval Station. One year later Subic closed and Joan spent the remainder of her DODDS career in Seoul, Korea, teaching ESL. As a teacher Joan loved and cared very much for her students. She was a voracious reader and was respected for her sharp mind, humor and quick wit. She is greatly missed by all who knew her.

ERIC HAMMERSHOY 1938 – 2006

Eric was born December 28, 1938, in Roulette, N.D. He was a graduate of Roulette High School and Jamestown College in North Dakota.

Eric taught mathematics at DoDDS schools in Turkey, England, and spent most of his career at Ramstein Junior High School in Germany where he retired in 1994. After his retirement, he worked as a driver for the Council on Aging in Amesbury, NH. He enjoyed watching old movies, reading westerns, cooking, and home improvement.

Eric passed away of heart complications on February 23, 2006. He is survived by Shirley, his wife of 38 years, his children Eric and Holly, and their families.

JULIA EASTMAN 1930 - 2006

Her lifelong mantra was, "I can do it" and she did! Born in El Paso, Texas, Julia Williams Eastman was a graduate of Radford School in 1948 and from Texas Western College in 1952. She also earned a Masters of Fine Arts degree from the University of New Mexico. As a scholarship recipient in New York, she studied with some of the great figures of theater including Stella Adler, Marcel Marceau and Martha Graham.

Arriving in Japan in 1967, Julia began a 35 year career teaching in DODDS all in Japan. Her ssignments included Sullivan ES and Ikego ES in Yokosuko and Byrd ES in Yokohama. She taught first, second, and third grades and especially enjoyed the challenge of ESL students. She also volunteered to teach a poetry club class that met after school and, at Ikego ES, she enjoyed teaching art classes. She loved her life in Japan and found it difficult to leave.

In July 2005 she retired to El Paso, Texas. She spent many days renovating her new home and unpacking her treasures. Living near the college, Julia immediately enrolled at UTEP in printmaking, theater and yoga class, in addition to her weekly Tai Chi sessions. Julia passed away peacefully in her home on August 27, 2006, surrounded by good friends.

DoDDS Transcript Information

The procedure for requesting DoDDS high school transcripts has been revised. Previously the Educational Testing Service was the depository for all high school transcripts. Thompson Prometric has taken over this responsibility. The following procedures are now in place for requesting a transcript.

FAX the following information to Thompson Prometric at 609-895-5026: Full Name, Name of School, Graduation Year with dates of attendance, where you want the transcript sent, your contact information. and your signature (this is required).

You also can mail the request to Thompson Prometric , Attn: DoDDS, P.O. Box 6605, Princeton, NJ 08541-6605. Requests take 2 weeks to process. The transcripts are free of charge.

LETTERS FROM OUR MEMBERSHIP

We often get letters from our membership with questions of how to get to Wichita and procedures for sending student and teacher artifacts to AOSHS. This letter from Barbara Manning Floto of Manhattan, NV, demonstrates the benefits of getting in touch with former DoDDS students. Barbara is a graduate of Itazuke High School, Class of "64".



I am an Air Force Brat. My dad, SMSgt. Leon Manning was stationed for two tours of duty in Japan. From 1952- 54 we were stationed in Nagoya, Japan. I went to first and second grade there. His second tour of duty was from 1960-64 at Itazuke Air Force Base, Japan near Fukuoka. I spent all four years of high school at Itazuke High School and we currently hold every two years alumni reunions in various parts of the USA. Our membership is around 1500 and we are still finding fellow educators and students.

These years spent overseas were special to me and my parents. My mother was a teacher and, in fact, was my senior English teacher! My dad was an excellent photographer and I have thousands of slides and black and white pictures he created depicting all aspects of the Japanese culture and school events. I also have diverse memorabilia and miscellaneous items that would support the everyday life of the school and its participants including my four yearbooks and the many posters advertising our Hambones Drama Club productions as well as the air base community productions we were involved. My mother is the reason why fellow student, Jerry Paine (he now goes by Jean Pierre Dorleac) became a successful costume designer and is noted for such films as Somewhere in Time, Lagoon, Battlestar Gallictica television series, and many other achievements. Larry Jerden, fellow student became a writer because of my mother's encouragement.

Many students were touched by her support of them...including myself! She would be so pleased to know there is an organization choosing to preserve overseas education! She past away 11 years ago. My dad is still living and resides at a military condo complex in McLean, Va. He highly supports your organization's efforts.

Our family not only invested six years of our lives living and learning about each other but offering input, skills, and talents appreciating the multitude of Japanese people we met and became our friends. It was a blessed time for us of which we never forgot.

We have many fond memories and artifacts to donate to the archives and museum.

My husband and I met as 14 and 15 year olds at Itazuke High School. He and I went "steady" for seven months before his father was shipped back stateside. Thirty-nine years later we found each other and were married.
