The AOSHS Memorial Program is proposed

A priority of the American Overseas Schools Historical Society (AOSHS) is the establishment of a site to display bricks, blocks and pavers sold through the organization's Memorial Program. These memorials have been purchased primarily by AOSHS membership, which includes individuals and alumni organizations.

With construction of the archives/visitors' center/museum complex dependent on raising significant funds, the establishment of a feature utilizing the memorial pieces would represent permanence, and provide inspiration toward funding the park in its entirety. It is in alignment with our organization's mission, which is "to collect, record, preserve and display the history and memorabilia of the American overseas schools, to include promoting public knowledge and understanding of this unique endeavor. A display would serve as a gathering point for past and present educators, administrators and students of American overseas schools, and would represent an opportunity to educate the general public about the history of both the schools and the historical events that led to American personnel living abroad with their families. Potential settings within the host organization could include parks or commons areas, rose gardens, fountain plazas, sculpture gardens, etc.

While the design of a feature suitable for an outdoor location will be somewhat site-specific and dependent on the needs and landscape plan of the hosting facility, some general design criteria for developing an installation of bricks, blocks and pavers should include:

- A design representative of the overall proposed flavor of the AOSHS Historical Park, focusing on the global nature of the American overseas schools.
- Installation in an outdoor environment with likelihood of visitation by AOSHS membership, future members, past donors and potential donors.
- Use of those memorial pieces sold to date.
- Ample opportunity for additional pieces to be inserted in the place of plain pieces sized the same (existing memorial pieces in the initial installation should represent approximately 1/3 of the overall opportunity).
- Opportunities for interpretive plaques featuring AOSHS history.
- Installation with enough permanence to provide reasonable security and durability of the memorial pieces, but with the ability to relocate them should the need to do so arise. Criteria should include a concrete base with concrete edging where pieces will be walked upon.
- Adaptability to the design criteria of the hosting organization, to include meeting all local/ national codes including ADA requirements.

Assuming the dedicated engraved memorial pieces should represent approximately 1/3 of the initial installation, we should be looking to cover approximately 700-850 sq. ft. Including some plain pavers.

Some visual examples have been gathered that represent installations for inspiration, along with examples of designs/placements that indicate layouts to be avoided, as we proceed in our quest for a suitable host location and the design phase that will follow a site selection. The visuals you see are only a sample of what we might be considering. Future Quarterlies will keep you updated on our progress.



An element of AOSHS's original site plan, the globe courtyard entrance surrounded by rings of bricks and an outer ring of flagpoles might be interpreted as an open globe sculpture within a fountain, with thin jets of water shooting from a pipe encircling the fountain ring suggesting the flagpoles. A semicircular wall with bench provides seating and a backdrop where larger pavers could mix with bricks, and where a cast bronze plaque could be centered that provides background on our organization.

FROM THE FACULTY LOUNGE SET TO RECALL LCHS AND BENEFITS AOSHS

What is likely to prove one of the most fascinating books yet written about a DoDDS school is set to be published this summer. 'From the Faculty Lounge' is a first- person account taking readers back through the history of London Central High School, England, through the memories of some of its teachers and staff.

With London Central closing its doors this June after 56 years of operation at three different locations around London, the book is set to be a timely look at an acclaimed DoDDS school. The 60,000+ word book contains individual memo-

ries from around 30 teachers and staff gleaned in interviews with them over the last three years. Those interviews were undertaken by Sean C. Kelly, a London Central High School Class of '78 graduate, and the on of a former DoDDS teacher and coach Martha Gail Kelly

From the Faculty Lounge is essentially a fond look back at a school which, thanks to its dormitories, had an international enrolment, at one point stretching from Moscow to Hawaii. However, it is the school and life in England, rather than the dormitories, that provide the major focus of the book that is also expected

to contain a small section of reproduced maps, letters and photography.

C o m m e n t s S e a n K e I l y : "Students attended London Central from the early 1950s through to 2007 and most of them would say that LCHS played a major part in their lives. So much has changed over the years that the experiences that my classmates and I had during my time at LCHS from in the 1970s Liffer as greatly to those of my fellow Bobcats in the 1950s as they do from the ones of those who became Centralites in the early years of the new millennium.

"As DoDDS students we mostly had 'snapshots' of London Central. What connects us? The answer, - for me, at least - is a shared experience — even if it is one that is decades apart and worlds away. And part of that shared experience comes from the faculty, staff and a commonly instilled educational ethos in a unique environment.

Former LCHS students share lots of their memories on the internet these days, but one aspect that they have not necessarily heard a lot about is the memories of their teachers. This book aims to partially redress that by interview-


ing a selection of faculty and staff from the early days right through to the final year.

"I would like to think that the book will rekindle mostly happy memories of what, for me, and I hope for many others, formed a cornerstone in our education and outlook on life. And some people may be surprised."

MARGE MARTIN DAWLEY

November 15, 1928 - March 1, 2007



Madge graduated from Shippensburg State Teacher's College and focused on Special Education. She taught in Pennsylvania and California, before joining DODDS. From 1959 to 1964, Madge taught in Japan, England, France and Germany. It was while she was teaching in Wiesbaden, Germany, that she met and married her husband, James Robertson Dawley. They had two children, Mary Jane (MJ) Dawley and James R. Dawley Jr.

PAUL GEORGE FRANCIS

July 1, 1925 – January 6, 2007

Paul was born in Pittsburgh, PA on July 1, 1925. After graduating from Harvard University in 1947, he received a Masters degree in History from Boston University. While traveling in London in 1952. he was hired to teach for DoDDS. During his career, he taught in London, Casablanca, Morocco, Dreux and Paris France, and Brussels, Belgium.

Paul retired after 43 years with DoDDS and moved to Palm Springs, California. He became very active in the art world, at St. Paul's in the Desert Episcopal Church, and with the organization Integrity.

BILLY EARL HARRIS

1924 - 2007

Bill was born in Texas and received his BA from Southwest Texas State in San Marcos and his MA from Our Lady of the Lake University in San Antonio. Antonio. His first assignment with DoDDS was in 1968 in Guantanamo, Cuba, as a teacher and counselor. He transferred to Roger Chaffee Elementary School in Bermuda in 1971 as a principal and later, counselor. He continued as a counselor in Newfoundland, Iceland, Holland, Bahrain and Greece before retiring to Texas in 1984.

EUGENE "GENE" BROWN 1939 - 2007

Gene began his federal career in the Fingerprint Division of the FBI. After graduation from East Carolina University in Greenville, NC, he began teaching and coaching in Virginia. He returned to North Carolina where he taught and coached before returning to federal service with the HEW school at Roosevelt Roads Naval Station, Puerto Rico. He transferred into DoDDS and taught and coached at Iwakuni, Japan; was athletic director at Kubasaki HS, Okinawa; and coached basketball and taught AP History and Social Studies at Berlin American High School. He received his MA from East Carolina University in 1980 and retired from DoDDS in 1994 with 23 years of service.

LLEWELLYN "LLEW" LIEBER

Llewellyn was born in St. Louis, Missouri. After earning her undergraduate degree at Harris Teachers College and a Masters' degree at ST. Louis University, Llew put her talents to work both as an elementary school teacher and a scriptwriter for a local radio station. Her award winning series on the "Missouri Constitution" probably influenced her concern about legal issues.

Llew's growing interest in world affairs led her into a very remarkable career with DoDDS. Assignments would take her to Libya, Japan and the Philippines. In Japan she started and was elected the first president of the American Teachers Union in the Far East and after moving to the Philippines, she founded the Clark Federation of Teachers. Upon earning her doctorate at Santo Tomas University in Manila, she became a school counselor at Clark AFB and remained there until her retirement.

Llewellyn retired to California and later relocated to be near family in Indiana. Always concerned with the welfare of others, she generously supported many charitable organizations involved with the environment, conservation, animals, education and human rights.

JOAN MENDEL 1931 – 2006

Vhen she wasn't busy teaching precocious third graders, she was rescuing stray animals and collecting food and clothing for a local orphanage. In fact it is almost impossible to walk through the halls of Yokota East Elementary School and not see something that Ms. Mendel hasn't touched.

In her 34 years at Yokota, Joan managed to create a legacy that is sure to last forever. She came to Japan more than 40 years ago and, after teaching for a few years at Johnson Elementary School, she transferred to Yokota Elementary School. When Yokota East opened in 1973, Joan was one of the first teachers to staff the school.

SECOND ANNOUNCEMENT G.D. (ROBERT) WILLIAMS

1931-2006

G. D. was born in Florida, went to local schools and, after high school, entered the University of Florida in Gainsville. In January 1951, after the first semester of his sophomore year, he enlisted in the U.S. Army with the 11th Airborne Division. He was honorably discharged in 1954, returned to the University of Florida and graduated with a BA in Education. In the summer of 1957 he entered the American University and earned an MA in Economics, received his teaching certificate, and completed his student teaching.

G.D. joined DoDDs in 1960 and taught in Japan, Spain, Turkey, Germany, England, and the Philippines. While in Japan he met and married his wife Fuki and adopted her daughter Ann. Their daughter Flora was born in 1968.

G.D. retired from DoDDs in 1987 and settled in New Orleans where he continued is interests of fishing, poker, classical music, history, watching professional wrestling and skydiving. He was killed July 22, 2006, in a fatal skydiving accident while making his 2255th jump.

Tom grew up in Tacoma, Washington, where he was active in sports, speech, drama, and served both as valedictorian and president of his high school senior class.

His education continued with Masters' Degrees in English, Philosophy, and Library Science. He was fluent in French and German and read Greek and Latin. He spent ten years in the Jesuit order before following his brother Larry into DoDDs. There he taught in Europe and Turkey and his deep love of books and music and his knowledge and enthusiasm inspired his students in literature and history. Subsequent assgnments found him in the Philippines and Korea as a librarian. While in the Philippines, his greatest adventure was the adoption of his three sons: Roger, Richard, and Diego.

Tom has been described as "a warm, sensitive, caring individual" with "a lively sense of humor". Family members saw a man of great courage as he dealt with Parkinsons' disease.

JOAN MAC DONALD 1926 – 2006

Joan was born in Dedham, Massachusetts, grew up and attended school in Boston. She studied at the University of New Hampshire for two years and then transferred to Simmons College in Massachusetts, graduating with a major in English. She earned a Master's Degree from Boston University and did post graduate work in Speech at Emerson College.

Joan's overseas career was in Panama, Puerto Rico, Okinawa, the Philippines, and Korea. Joan was reassigned to Japan when Mt. Pinatubo erupted in the Philippines but was able to take advantage of the poprtunity to return to Subic Bay Naval Station One year later Subic closed and Joan spent the remainder of her DODDS career in Seoul, Korea, teaching ESL.

U.S. SENATORS



Senator John Cornyn, III (R-Texas) (1952-)

John Cornyn is an Air Force and Overseas Brat. He is a 1969 Graduate of Tokyo American High School. His father, a B-17 pilot in World War II, later became a dentist and served for thirty-one years in the U.S. Air Force and, later, taught at the University of Texas Health Science Center in San Antonio. Senator Cornyn was elected to the US Senate in 2002, taking over the Senate seat previously occupied by Army Brat Phil Graham (R-Texas). Senator John S. McCain, III (R-Arizona) (1936-)

REFLECTIONS ON HINTERBRAND LODGE

My experience with Hinterbrand Lodge is very unique for I have seen both sides of this wonderful program.

I am what is known as a DoDDS product. I was born overseas to a DoDDS educator and spent my entire schooling in DoDDS schools. I remember at a young age my father talking to me about an outdoor program that he worked during the summers of the early 70's-back when the program was just beginning. Throughout my childhood I would learn about wonderful stories of adventure in the Bavarian Alps and how high school students would struggle to deal with environmental challenges and different puzzle solving problems in the woods. It all seemed very exciting to a kid-I could only wish I was older and able to have the experience myself.

And then the day came. The summer after my junior year in high school, just as I was becoming a senior, I finally got my chance. I would spend three weeks of my summer vacation in Berchtesgaden, Germany at a course well known to me by then called Project Bold.

To say Project Bold was the best thing I've ever done is an understatement for this was the turning point in my life and helped steer me in the direction I have chosen today.

After my "PB" experience, I knew I wanted more. I wanted to work the same program my father had worked, the program that I had participated in myself, the program that was the best thing I had ever done. So, following graduation I applied and was accepted to work the pilot program for another DoDDS outdoor program called Spirit of Adventure which was modeled after Project Bold but located in Wales. At this time, DoDDS employed college students to work as assistants; however, we were graced with the title of "sherpa" due to our nonteacher status.

From here I entered college and spent three years pursuing an accounting degree all the while spending my summers working either Spirit of Adventure or Project Bold until the end of summer 1991. It was at this time that DoDDS changed policy. In order to work either of these programs, you had to be a DoDDS employee-there would be no more student Sherpa or stateside hired employees. was crushed.



In August of 1991 I was transferring to a new university to finish my accounting degree. Not anymore! I did go to my new university; however, I changed my major to education with the sole desire to someday make it back overseas and into DoDDS so I could once again be a part of the most incredible program I knew.

My college career expanded into what could be the world's longest undergrad degree. My parents were distraught. I watched as peers my own age graduated while I had years of classes still ahead of me due to the drastic change in major. I did my student teaching overseas at SHAPE international school in hopes that by having DoDDS experience it would help me attain a job with the same system. After graduation, I worked in the Seattle school system trying to acquire the necessary experience DoDDS required. I made constant phone calls and wrote letters asking for employment and then in 1997 I received my first teaching assignment back overseas at Sembach Elementary/Middle School.

From this point on I worked every summer back at Project Bold and saw hundreds of kids go through the same three-week program that had been running out of the very same lodge for over 30 years.

Thousands of students from every global country housing a DoDDS school, from multiple ethnic backgrounds and with varying personal experiences and struggles have participated in the hinterbrand experience. Every student came and left with an experience totally unique to him or herself yet all the same in certain ways. They all agreed with one prior students quote, "I hated every minute, loved every day".

Why? I will try to simplify the outdoor education process as best I can in hopes that all can understand. Hinterbrand Lodge bases its philosophy on the ideals of a man known as Kurt Hahn. This man found that during war times, the younger generations of soldiers were more likely to give up in times of severe conflict while the elder soldiers would join together and push to survive. After studying this phenonomem, he found the reasons were due to their life history. The older soldiers had lived and persevered through rough times in their lives and therefore were more willing to persevere when times got rough.

Hahn took these findings and developed a program which would place individuals in difficult scenarios in order to teach them how to work through their problems both individually and as a team.

After accomplishing the elements of an outdoor education course, application to real life is then discussed and processed so as to help the individual incorporate these learning's into every day life experiences. Students come away from these programs with better self-actualization and team building/cohesiveness skills.

The results that can be seen in the young men and women who participate in these programs are extreme. In a very short span of time, parents, friends, and educators of these participants have commented on the enormous growth they have seen in these individuals

DoDDS Transcript Information

The procedure for requesting DoDDS high school transcripts has been revised. Previously the Educational Testing Service was the depository for all high school transcripts. Thompson Prometric has taken over this responsibility. The following procedures are now in place for requesting a transcript.

FAX the following information to Thompson Prometric at 609-895-5026: Full Name, Name of School, Graduation Year with dates of attendance, where you want the transcript sent, your contact information. and your signature (this is required).

You also can mail the request to Thompson Prometric , Attn: DoDDS, P.O. Box 6605, Princeton, NJ 08541-6605. Requests take 2 weeks to process. The transcripts are free of charge.

AOSHS Individual Life Membership Program


