


AOSHS celebrates our Volunteer of the Quarter

Dear AOSHS Members,

Where have the days and years gone? I retired from DoDDS in August of 2002. That next year I became an AOSHS Board member with Ann Bamberger as President. In August of 2005 I accepted the position of President for a term. so I have served as your president for three years. During this time, we had an outside firm (The Bradford Report) make recommendations of how we might do business. We did attempt to obtain large funding from Congress, local governments, and private individuals. When this didn't work, we hired an advisor chairperson to head up how we might raise funds.

As the days and months passed, we realized that we needed to take a reality check and become an organization we could be proud of and do what our mission states. This mission is to collect, record, and preserve the unique history of educating American children and youth abroad. With this in mind we now are the proud owners of property on Douglas Avenue in Wichita, Kansas with an office, two part-time employees, an archive, and small museum. We have a partnership with the World Treasures Museum in Wichita. We have on loan to them large items for display like a section of the Berlin Wall. We also lend changing displays that use items from our individual and institution collections. We have cataloged and continue to record our collections through a program, Past Perfect.

We are most proud that our organization operates totally in the black. With a fragile economy and other organizations asking for our donations, AOSHS has no immediate worries. Our membership is a continued effort to get both educators and student/alumni to join AOSHS. We have two databases with information on educators, students, and alumni as to where they have been aboard and what education they achieved. We have a dedicated Board that often takes on a small responsibility after they leave the Board. This is something we want to continue. Lastly, AOSHS has a website that is updated and strives to stay current and with interactive components.

It is with great pride that I thank the membership and the Board of Directors for allowing me to be your President for the past three years. As I leave office this summer, I will have fond memories of coming to Wichita twice a year to see how we are growing and how we are evolving to become a research facility for people to use. I will not seek a second term for it is my time now to allow me to pursue my passion of living in the out of doors and working on projects such as "No Child Left Indoors". I am involved in my county township to create a natural preserve and hiking area for the public to use. Many of you also know that I am hiking the Appalachian Trail and still have miles to go before the complete 2,168 miles is highlighted on a map.

There is an AOSHS commitment I will make to the membership after I leave the Board this year. I want to create a location for us to put our Bricks, Blocks, and Pavers. This I intend to do with the help of people who can influence a location on the East coast where you and our future generations will come to honor those that had something to do with living, learning, teaching, and being abroad for the good of children and their learning.

AOSHS Honors Rex Gleason

It is not customary for AOSHS to publish an obituary in the Quarterly. We honor our members and colleagues through our memorial program. The following obituary is one of great interest for us, for Rex Gleason was one of the DoDDS pioneers and his time in DoDDS was significant.



Rex L. Gleason passed from this earthly life Saturday, April 12, 2008, at the age of 94. He was born Feb. 21, 1914, to Milo and Nannie Gleason in the small community of Cundiff, located near Jacksboro, Texas. As a child, he attended Forth Worth Public Schools and was a graduate of Central High School (now Trimble Tech). He received his bachelors degree from Texas Wesleyan College in Fort Worth, followed by a master's degree in school administration at Texas Christian University. He also attended the University of Maryland.

Rex taught at Mineral Wells High School before entering the Army in 1942 and was posted to various stateside bases before being dispatched to the South Pacific. He was stationed in Manila in the Philippines at the close of World War II. He was honorably discharged in 1946 with the rank of infantry captain.

The Overseas Brats reported on Mr. Gleason's passing, "After the war, he was among the pioneering group of educators sent to Europe to organize a new school system for American dependents of overseas personnel. He started as a math teacher in Munich, and as well as teaching all levels. He lived in and supervised the boys' dorm, with no extra pay in those days. He became principal there a year or two later. He told wonderful stories about having no paper for the students to use that first year, so he had them bring in bags from the commissary on which they could do their math problems. He served as principal of the American Junior High School in Frankfurt, Germany, and later at George C. Marshall High School in Ankara, Turkey, before retiring in 1975. He was a true DoDDS pioneer.

Troop changes cause DoDDS school closures and reorganizations

As the military numbers decrease in Europe, DoDDS schools either close or are reorganized. Nine schools closed last year and that same number will close in June 2008. These schools are: Argonner ES, Hanau MS/HS, Dexheim ES, Wuerzburg ES/MS, Wuerzburg HS, Grafenwoehr MS, Gaeta ES, Darmstadt ES/MS, and Neubruecke ES. A DoDDS spokesman says there are no school closure plans for next year.

Schools are busy with closure ceremonies. For example, on June 6, Wuerzburg HS will hold a ceremony to mark the school's closure after 54 years. Principal Walter Seely said it is disappointing to say goodbye to the beloved school and leave a community that many families have enjoyed being stationed in over the years. "It's very sad to see such a nice community leave," said Seely, who has served as principal since 2001. "This is a nice place to live, especially for the families." At the height of the Cold War, Wuerzburg High was one of the biggest Defense Department schools in Europe. At its peak, the school enrolled 1,000 students.



Today, there are about 160 students, Seely said. Some alumni are planning to travel from the U.S. to attend the closing ceremony. The school is selling black T-shirts to commemorate the event. The Schweinfurt students who attended Wuerzburg will attend Bamberg HS next year.

Two school areas are consolidating: AF North ES and AF North HS are becoming AF North ES/HS and Aviano MS and Aviano HS are consolidating into Aviano MS/HS. The increased troop movement to the Vilseck/Grafenwoher area caused the need for construction of two new schools, Netzaberg Elementary , pictured above, and Netzaberg MS, which will open in August 2008. Construction on the school complex began in July 2005. Netzaberg MS is pictured above.

Dr. Tafoya announces his retirement as DoDEA Director

Dr. Joseph Tafoya announced he will be retiring as the Director of DoDEA in June. He has served as the Director since 2000. He came to DoDEA in 1999 when he was named the Deputy Director of DoDEA for Domestic Dependent Elementary and Secondary Schools (DDESS).

Dr. Tafoya began his career in 1969 as a teacher with the San Diego city Schools. He then became the Assistant and then Deputy Superintendent for Curriculum of the Santa Ana Unified School District.

During his eight years as the Director, Dr. Tafoya worked to standardize, unify and solidify their mission. Major accomplishments include the development of common staffing standards, curriculum initiatives, a common approach to planning for the budget, the employment of strong academic standards and consistency of instruction.

He sent an email to all the staff prior to the public announcement, and stated, "As some of you know, I have been a geographic bachelor the last nine years and I think it's time for me to go home and spend time with my family. I know that's a trite kind of saying for people in Washington, but for me, it's absolutely the truth."

More DoD Schools Made Known

The list continues. In the last couple months, I've received information about two more DoD schools. Dr. Joanne Calhoun, from Ocean Springs, MS sent a letter after she had read the latest list of DDESS schools that were in the Winter *Quarterly*.

Dr. Calhoun writes, "I'm writing again, this time in regards to DDESS schools. I attended such a school on Langley AFB (then called Langley Field) from 1935 to 1937 and again from 1940 to 1942 when I finished 6th grade.

"In the early years the school was located in the area where the dirigibles were housed called "lighter than air". We rode 6x6 Army trucks to attend. When I returned in 1940, there was a well built elementary school in the main officer housing area. It went through the 6th grade. The school was operational during '37 to '40 as I had friends who attended during that period. I have no idea how the school was funded, but I seem to recall that my parents paid some tuition."

Dr. Calhoun also had good information about the school at Kirtland AFB. Her daughter attended it in 1967, shortly after it was turned over to the Albuquerque, NM Public Schools. This school, Sandia ES, was listed in the last *Quarterly*.

Another interesting discovery is from Marian Paulsen, who sent Tom Drysdale an account of her experience in Greenland. I intend to include the entire story of her experiences in Greenland in the Memories section of our AOSHS website.

After Germany occupied Denmark in April 1940. Greenland was placed under the protection of the U.S. to prevent Germany from building air bases that could be used to launch air attacks on the United States and Canada. The U.S. subsequently built 3 air bases on the island. One was at Narsarsssuak near the southern tip. After the war, this air base was used as a refueling station until aircraft were developed that could fly the Atlantic non-stop. Families were eventually allowed to accompany their sponsors. The Air Force built family housing and a school became a necessity. Narsarssuak ES had about 60 students in grades 1-8. There were 3 classrooms. The few high school students took correspondence Marian taught at Narsarssuak ES 1957-58, its last year of operation.

This school has now been added to the overseas list. I would appreciate information on a date when the school opened, and who was responsible for its operation.

Evelyn was born in Osco, Illinois, and received her B.A. from Western Illinois University. She later received her M.A. from Ball State University in Muncie, Indiana. She also received an Advanced Degree from the University of Heidelberg in Germany.

Evelyn taught in DoDDS schools all over the world. She entered the program in 1954 when she was assigned to Hamadera ES, Japan, where she later taught at Grant Heights and Misawa. Other postings were in Orleans, France; Vicenza, Italy; Heidelberg and Pirmasens, Germany; Peshawar, Pakistan; Addid Ababa, Ethiopia; and finally her favorite, Iraklion, Crete where she stayed until her retirement in 1984. Evelyn's favorites were the intermediate grades. She was active in all school functions and extracurricular activities.

She was devoted to her family in Alpha, Illinois, and would assist her sister at the family local diner during summer vacations. Among her hobbies were travel, corresponding with her former students, teaching Sunday school and avidly solving crossword puzzles.

James Lee Handorf

June 17, 1933 - January 1, 2008

James was born and raised in Iowa and graduated from the University of Northern Iowa in 1954. He served in the US Army from 1954 -1956 in Japan and taught in Iowa at Marshalltown High School from 1956 to 1962. In 1962 his teaching career with DoDDS took him back to Japan where he taught business education at Johnson HS. It was there that he met and married his wife Nancie. In 1964 they moved to Germany where he taught for 2 more years at Kaiserslautern HS

Upon his return to the states, he taught at Malcolm Price Laboratory School. He earned his PhD from the University of Northern Colorado and taught in the UNI College of Business until his retirement in 1990...

He was active in many professional organizations at local, state, and national levels and received numerous awards for outstanding achievement and leadership in the field of Business Education. During retirement, Jim was an active volunteer with his church and various community groups. He twice received the Mayors' Volunteer Performance Award and received the Alumni Service Award from UNI in 1999.

James passed away in January of 2008 after a 22 year battle with cancer. He is survived by his wife of 44 years, Nancie, and his children Mellisa, Eric, and Stephen.

Frances Callahan was born and raised in Lewiston, Maine. She received her BA in history from Seton Hill College and her Masters from Boston College. Cal began her DoDDS career in 1953 when she sailed on a ship to Yoyogi, Japan. Her early assignments were in schools which are now closed: Merignac, France; Hahn, Germany; Laon, France, Bushey Hall, London, England; and Izmir, Turkey. Cal taught in Naples, Italy (Forrest Sherman MS) from 1969-1983 and in Kubasaki HS, Okinawa from 1983-1992.

Cal retired to Tampa, Florida where she and her cat, Nikko, held court. She enjoyed visiting with family and friends, playing bridge, volunteering for charitable causes, following Florida Democratic party politics, and telling a good story. To many, Cal was the true "Auntie Mame." Her Irish wit, entertaining stories, and unique sense of humor made a day in Ms. Callahan's classroom an unforgettable experience.

1930 - 2007

Raymond was born on September 25, 1930 in Uxbridge, MA. He was a graduate of Douglass High School and received his BA degree from Wisconsin State University in 1954. He also attended SUNY in Oneonta, NY, Worcester State College and UMASS Amherst. He was a veteran of the Korean War, serving in the US Air Force.

Ray joined DoDDS in 1965 where he taught math and science at Boeblingen High School in Germany. He transferred to Heidelberg JHS and taught there until he retired in 1990. After retirement, Ray worked at a local drugstore in Uxbridge and as a gardener for the Uxbridge Public Library. He was a member of St. Mary's Church and the Uxbridge Veterans of Foreign Wars.

Ruth McCampbell

1923 - 2007

Ruth joined DoDDS after having raised her four beloved children. Following years in Bermuda, Cuba, Iceland and Bamberg, Germany, she applied for a Sabbatical at age 60, saying she needed to keep learning "like any other young girl". Ruth enjoyed her adventure as a coed at George Washington University, living in an efficiency apartment in Foggy Bottom. She returned to Germany until her retirement from Gelnhausen. She saw age as no limiting factor, often traveling with her philosophy of "a little culture, a little shopping, a little food". Ruth always had an extra "spark" to share with new teachers, friends facing romantic heartaches, and children needing help. Whether her classroom was in a W.W.I mess hall, a defunct slaughterhouse, or an antique orphanage, Ruth took the world in stride, and helped her colleagues do likewise.

Her dramatic flair cheered us all. We never got to actually meet her 'Ambassador', but Ruth regaled us with tales of his devotion to duty with dramatic gestures and a chorus of her signature song -"Smoke Gets in Your Eyes". Friends enjoyed her Valentines with photos of her 'searching' for him on a camel in Egypt or in front of the men's room. And no one could forget twelve hours in England, on a bus loaded with terrified, stranded passengers, buffeted by torrential winds and downpour, when Ruth held them entranced with her infamous 'striptease' by which she somehow created the illusion while removing only a wool muffler and gloves!

That's our Ruth - and all who were ever stationed with her have stories of her love of history, her sense of humor, and her devotion to our DoDDS family that we'll never forget.

Sebastian Michelena

June 16, 1940 - January 15, 2008

Sebastian Michelena was a resident of Buffalo, Wyoming. Following graduation from Arvada High School, he attended Sheridan College for two years, received is Bachelors Degree from Black Hills State College, and his Masters Degree from the University of Wyoming. Prior to teaching with DoDDs, he taught in Sheridan Wyoming, and Lovelock, Nevada.

His DoDDS experience began in 1969 as a secondary teacher in Brindisi, Italy. He then became the Art and Business Coordinator, working out of Karlsruhe, Germany, and created an innovative Business Laboratory well in advance of other programs at that time. While serving in the Mediterranean Region he was noted for arranging and conducting summer workshops for art teachers in historically important settings, broadening the scope of the Art Program by focusing on the contributions of the host country. In his following assignments as an Educational Coordinator for the Heidelberg District in Germany and the Mediterranean District in Vicenza, Italy, he continued to include host nation activities in his programs. He retired in 2005. Mich was a respected, dedicated educator, a gentleman willing to help when ever and where ever he was needed. 



Scott Hawley's book describes Frankfurt HS life

Book Review: Hot Times During the Cold War

Scott Hawley is an Overseas Brat who attended Frankfurt High School from 1985-1988. He has written a book, *Hot Time During the Cold War*, which Scott describes as a "funny, poignant look at what it was like to search for normalcy under the most extreme set of circumstances." It was reviewed in the December 2007 edition of *Overseas Brats*.

After attending school in Frankfurt, Scott commented, "Twenty years later I published a book about life as an American teenager living in West Germany during the Cold War. And although I attended a different school than you and probably lived in a different foreign county, we certainly shared many of the same joys, challenges, and heartaches unique to being overseas brats."

Brats readers have found the book appealing, as indicated by portions of the next two reviews. "As a 1986 graduate of Frankfurt American High School the pages of this book took me back to a time when my life changed forever! Whether or not you are a graduate of FAHS, life as an American teen in Germany is written within these pages. Those of us who experienced our teen life in Europe can relate to this book word for word!"

"And while Hawley's individual memories are unique to his Frankfurt experience, the larger themes of his book: living in a barbed wire bubble; dealing with the base's front and back gates; terrorists trying to kill US servicemen and their families; and worrying about the Cold War becoming "hot" -- those were all things that became part of my DNA while going to school at Frankfurt."

Shadows on an Iron Curtain illustrates the clashing tensions that existed between the Soviet Union and the United States from the end of World War II as seen through the naïve eyes of a young widow, Megan James. During the 1970's, the 2nd and 3rd Armored Cavalry troops and their support units defending East/West German borders were on constant Alert against


