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The Mission of AOSHS is to collect, record and preserve for posterity the history of educating American children and youth abroad; to honor and recognize the sacrifice, dedication and service to the United States by educators, students and families from every state and territory; and to recognize contributions American students and educators have made, and are making, in advancing democracy abroad.

The "bottom line" in this fundraising update is to inform members that we fully recognize the importance of the relationship between AOSHS and the mission of this country's government. Our members have known this from the beginning, but we did not realize the full importance of it until the aftermath of September 11, 2001.

The Departments of Defense and State, the State of Kansas, and the City of Wichita are all publicly supported government or governmentrelated entities. While AOSHS is related to these entities, we do not share in any of their tax supported funds. We hope this realization will give our readers an indication of the main fundraising focus of the society during and following this uncertain time in the history of our country.

We have also recognized that during this tragic period in American history, AOSHS, with the support of dedicated members worldwide, was able to improve financially by meeting a permanent, national need rather than a local, temporary need. It has become clear that AOSHS will exist as long as the US Departments of Defense and State have personnel with families stationed abroad. Families with



children mean schools, and schools mean AOSHS.

Compare this with thousands of local nonprofit corporations that exist due to local needs, are supported mainly by local funding sources, and are temporary. AOSHS, on the other hand, exists to satisfy a national situation that will exist as long as there is a United States of America.

Following the advice of six large and successful military museums in the southeastern United States prior to 9/11/01, AOSHS had prepared written proposals to submit to foundations with a history of donating specifically to the endowment funds of nonprofit corporations.

Immediately following 9/11/01, this plan was hold indefinitely due to put on the inappropriateness of requesting money from others when the whole country was focused on helping those affected by the terrorist attacks. Interestingly, though not surprisinaly. donations from members to the AOSHS Endowment Funds accelerated and continue to do so to this day. As a result, AOSHS has more stable become and financially independent during a time when many nonprofit corporations have declared bankruptcy or been forced out of business. The society has also used this time to become more efficient by diversifying, expanding the board of directors from seven members in one state to nine in three states, soliciting more volunteers, and incorporating in Kansas.

Since 9/11/01, a faltering economy, bear market, and the possibility of another war in the Middle East have combined to slow Americans' overall giving; nonprofit organizations are leery of the future, because the economy and the stock markets have failed to revive.

AOSHS is member driven and we plan to keep the membership informed of our fundraising progress. We are in the planning stages of a comprehensive funding request, and are encouraged due to the society's financial growth and prosperity in spite of a weak economy, political uncertainty, and international tension. AOSHS remains strong and grows stronger every day.

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# "CLARENCE THE CRUSADER" Now on Display in Wichita

"Clarence the Crusader," a mid-nineteenth century authentic hand made replica of a 15th century German knight's suit of armor, is now on loan from the American Overseas Schools Archive to the Ancient Treasures Museum in Wichita, Kansas.

The suit of armor was affectionately known as *Clarence the Crusader* by students of the Bonn School on the Rhine (elementary) and Bonn American High School from 1952 to 1997. He was a gift to the students and faculty by Ruby Anderson, the first principal.

The knight's armor was christened "Clarence" after a naming contest at the school. Mary Pat Allen, who later graduated with the class of 1971, was the winner. A knighting ceremony was then held at the base theater where school assemblies were held.

In 1997, when 150 BAHS Alumni arrived in Bonn for a Homecoming Reunion to witness preparations for the closing of their almamater and pack boxes of school memorabilia for shipment to the American Overseas Schools Archive, it was learned that Clarence was going to be transferred to another school in Germany. The association president, Linda Wagner, hurriedly called Tom Drysdale, who in called Sam Tryon, the district turn superintendent. Sam drove to Bonn, picked up Clarence and, as agreed. temporarily displayed him in the district office in Brussels for two years. Clarence then was disassembled and shipped to the AOS Archive in Wichita. (See the Spring 2000 AOSHS Quarterly).

To properly prepare Clarence for exhibit in the future American Overseas Schools Historical Park Museum in Wichita, members of the Bonn AHS Alumni Association, again under the guidance of Linda Wagner, donated money for the construction of a new armature and protective enclosure, complete with AOSHS plaque, in which he now stands.

Under the personal guidance and supervision of Jon. K. Kardatzke (MD Ret.), Director of the Ancient Treasures Museum, Clarence was reassembled on the armature and is now prominently on display in the security and climate-controlled environment of the museum for all to enjoy.

Since the time he was in medical school, Dr. Kardatzke has searched the world over for ancient treasures of all types, shapes and sizes. In addition to being able to visit Clarence, a trip to the museum is a once in a lifetime experience and highly recommended to all members.

The museum, soon to be moved to a larger facility, is located at 250 West Douglas in downtown Wichita, and has over 10,000 sq. ft. of exhibits areas, including the "Hall of Ancients," the "Hall of Royalty," and the "Hall of the Americas." On display are original signed historical documents, dinosaurs (T-Rex & Triceratops), Egyptian sarcophagi, a

presidential collection, a Historic Manuscript Library, Royal Crown Jewels celebrity Bali. of memorabilia. and much, much more, When you visit Wichita, be sure to visit The Ancient Treasures Museum. truly a one-of-a-kind collection-and. of course, say hello to Clarence the Crusader.

#### JACK R. KEARNS (1925 - 1977)

Jack was born in Ft. Dodge, Iowa, and graduated from Loran College in Dubuque and from Iowa State University, Ames, where he received baccalaureate degrees. Later he earned his master's degree from Ball State University overseas program. Jack taught in Hayward, California, before joining DoDDs in 1957. He taught in the Philippines, Japan, Morocco, Germany, Turkey and Crete, Greece. He remained at Iraklion, Crete, until his death. The school was later renamed the Jack R. Kearns School in his honor.

#### JAMES R. "COACH" ELLIOTT (1921 - 2002)

James R. "Coach" Elliott was born June 6, 1921 and passed away on September 21, 2002. Jim graduated from Rankin High School, served with the Coast Guard during WWII in the Atlantic and Pacific theaters, and earned Bachelor of Science and Master of Education Degrees from Texas Tech University in Lubbock, Texas. Following four years of teaching and coaching in West Texas, Jim joined DoDDS in 1956, teaching physical education, math, health, and social studies and coaching both men and women's interscholastic sports. He retired in 1984. His assignments were: Misawa, Japan; Greenham Common, England; Wheelus Air Base, Tripoli, Libya; Chateauroux, France; '60 – '63 Narimasu High School, Tokyo, Japan; '63 – '64 Tripoli, Libya; '64 – '84 H.H. Arnold High School, Wiesbaden, Germany. Following his retirement, the athletic field at H. Arnold High School was named Elliott Field in his honor.

# Wurzburg Wolves Return...

Everywhere we go-oh, People wanna know-oh! Who we are...So, we're gonna tell 'em... W-W-W-u-r-z, B-u-B-u-B-u-r-g, W-U-R-Z-B-U-R-G! Würzburg Wolves!

This particular cheer-chant echoed recently in the halls of Würzburg American High School, NOT by the class of 2003, but rather by the founding Wolves from the classes of '55 to '63.

This past October, some 200 Wolves returned for Homecoming Week. No ordinary reunion, this gathering was focused on the sons and daughters of Operation Gyroscope, a unique military experiment in the 50's that flip-flopped entire divisions in the US and Europe. Joanie (Covington) LaFond, who was among the 'wave' of teens arriving in Germany in 1957, was relentless in her three-year search to find those Wolves and faculty members from WHS's early years and organize а Homecoming that would reunite them back in Würzburg.

During the 6-day reunion filled with multiple activities, they presented the school with a commemorative Victory Bell and City Hall with a Friendship Bell. An elected official of the Wurzburg City Council reiterated to them the impact of Operation Gyroscope and her remarks were awarded a standing ovation. Reminiscent of the '60 prom, their week together culminated with a Saturday night Victory Dinner Dance, cruising on the Main River under the bridges and lights of Würzburg. "The Wolves won the Homecoming game, but our real victory was that we were together again, said Joanie LaFond. "Operation Gyroscope was unique. It was the first time the families traveled aboard ship with their Dads and the troops. It was the beginning of the 'sponsorship' program, where inbound families were met at the dock in Bremerhaven or the train station at their final destination by their sponsors and taken to their quarters or apartments on the economy. Fresh bed linens and a three-day supply of food were waiting for

them. The GYRO stabilized three-year tours and encouraged cohesion and team spirit within units who knew they were going to be together for an extended period of time. The esprit de corps filtered down to the families. Her twin sister, Jean Covington Simonsen, chimed in: "We came together. We left together. We were FAMILY. That's why this is not the usual kind of rah-rah reunion. Your father was over here laving his life on the line and your family was here, too." Joanie added: "The final 'wave' of GYRO ONE landed in Europe in 1957, and while the Operation was considered a success and many of its concepts still are in place today, GYRO TWO never came to be, and the mass movement of families with troops has not been repeated. I felt the era needed to be honored and I was committed to get the 'Gyro Babies' back to Würzburg."

The Wolves and their faculty who attended Homecoming in 2002 represented 27 states, with California, Florida, Texas, Virginia and Georgia in the lead. Raf Cruz, Class of '60, arrived from Puerto Rico. Janey Palasky Turner, '55, and the secretary of the first graduating class, flew in from Thailand. Her classmate, Larry Wilkerson, President of WHS's first Student Council and co-captain of

its first football team, arrived from Kansas and had the honor of tossing the coin at the Homecoming game. Carol (Holmquist) Aili of MN, '60, and one of only three returning alumni who attended WHS all four years, shared: "Making a connection with my roots that had been lost these past 40-plus years was very meaningful to me by attending Homecoming. I am so proud to have been a part of that era with such high-quality teachers, education and school spirit that I did not know even continues today." Jan (Cravens) Lakin, '58, a returning cheerleader married to former WHS football player Phil Lakin, '59, summed up their feelings about the reunion by saying, "What an incredible experience, returning to our high school to revisit with old friends and faculty. Never in our wildest dreams did we think that we would reunite, especially back in Würzburg. We had scattered like seeds in the wind!" Wanda (Gibson) Day, '56, a former cheerleader who attended WHS its first two years and the school's first Homecoming Queen, reminisced: "In our teens we didn't realize we were making friendships and memories that would stay with us forever. Many of us lost touch with each other over the years, but the memories were always with us...waiting for this time and this place. Our Homecoming wasn't meant to be an ending, but another chance to make new memories with old friends."

Fourteen former Würzburg faculty members attended the festivities, including four from 1954-'55, which was the year WHS opened. Included in the group were Sally Henry, English and P.E. teacher; Gordon Smith, the second principal of WHS; and Robert Johnson, English teacher, who said, "To relive an experience that is indelibly etched into one's life is a rare opportunity. The reunion of Würzburg faculty and students after 40 years was especially significant, and will be long remembered as a truly unique time *together.*"

Lt.Gen. (Ret.) H.G. "Pete" Taylor, Chairman of the Board, Military Child Education Coalition (MCEC), announced in an August 2002 Special Supplement of *On the Move*, their official magazine, that the Bernard Curtis Brown II Scholarship was established in honor of an 11-year-old military child who lost his life when the airliner on which he was a passenger crashed into the Pentagon on September 11, 2001.

General Taylor also announced that the first recipient of the scholarship is Buck A. Tanner, a student at London Central High School and the son of Lt.Col. (US Army) and Mrs. Albert B. Tanner.

Buck, 14 years old, an Eagle Scout and member of the National Junior Honor Society, is active in track, baseball, soccer, basketball and wrestling. Quoting from his scholarship application he stated that "I am in a family of engineers and my goal is to attend MIT and become an aerospace engineer. My father is a mechanical engineer who received his MS degree from MIT. My oldest sister, currently a sophomore at MIT, is working to become a mechanical engineer and my second sister has recently been accepted at MIT."

We congratulate Buck on this honor and wish him all the best in his very promising future.


