Membership Drive Underway

lans for a membership drive during the course of the next year were unveiled at the Eighth Annual Membership Meeting in Atlanta. During the past three years, Tom Drysdale has controlled the membership numbers to keep them within manageable limits. The new computer-based AOSHS Management System (AMS) developed this past spring, however, has been in use since June 1 and will now allow us to expand the membership numbers. The system is now fully automated, allowing quicker data entry, and provides several reports unavailable under the previous program.

The membership drive will have a two-pronged approach. First, we hope that every member will be able to recruit at least one new member. You will note on the new membership application form (Attach. # 1) that there is a line at the bottom for your name as the referring member. If you send these off to friends to encourage them to join, please fill in your name on that line so we can properly recognize your efforts. And please don't think you have to stop at one; two are better than one, and three are even better than two. You may reproduce the application forms as necessary.

Another idea some members have used is giving AOSHS memberships as gifts for birthdays, holidays and retirements--all wonderful ideas. Your friend will remember your gift with the receipt of each Quarterly. You, too, will reap a further benefit with an income tax deduction. To give a membership as a gift, just fill out the application with your friend's information, and sign your name on the referral line.

The second part of the membership expansion includes the alumni. Alumni membership will play a large part in the future of AOSHS. The automated system will allow us to handle the volume of new data to actively seek new alumni members. A one-page, two-sided insert will be sent to the alumni associations in the next few months with the request that the page be included in the next issue of their alumni newsletter. It will include information about AOSHS as well as a membership application form. Copies of the recently completed fundraising DVD, which can be shown at reunions, will be included.

AOSHS has made great strides, but to reach our goal and attain the necessary funding, it is important we have a large, supportive constituency. Every member can be an important volunteer by bringing a new member into the Society.



Times Change

And So Does Nürnberg

Recently, I visited a German friend from my 1960's adolescence in the Nürnberg, Germany area. As I turned off the autobahn, I found myself in what had been the American military housing area at Fürth.

Drawdowns in the 1990s closed the American compound there, and the various buildings – base, family housing, school, PX and commissary – are now in German hands. I visited five years ago and noted few substantial changes at that time, beyond the loss of the community theater. The old building where I enjoyed Saturday matinees and working on high school plays had already been torn down. I wondered if that was the fate awaiting the rest of the compound.

But I was more than pleasantly surprised on this June day in 2003. As I drove the familiar streets on which our family had lived — Jakob-Wassermann-Strasse, Gerhardt-Hauptmann-Strasse — I found a thriving new German community. Gone were the open parking lots



and lawns, replaced now by traditional fenced gardens filled with trees, shrubs and colorful arrays of blossoming plants. The apartment buildings, I learned, had been totally renovated inside and out. The

evidence of renewal was abundant: colorful exterior paints and trendy new balcony treatments. The community was alive with German families where once my classmates and our families had lived.

Nürnberg American High School, which I attended in the early 1960s, also had been put to new use, as had the little building behind it, where I taught Sunday school and vacation

Bible school as a teenager.

Between the housing area and the vast PX and commissary building, a district of German garden houses had stood during my teen years. I remember bicycling through the charming enclave on my way to work as a PX clerk for two summers during high school. Sometime before the 1980s, the garden district had given way to an open avenue between the housing area and the retail outlets. But now the huge, once pink, three-winged, four-story PX and commissary complex also was gone. The enormous building, I was told, was too large and would have been far too costly to renovate. And so it had been leveled. The valuable land soon would give birth to a new use.

Every few years during the past forty, I've somehow managed to visit the Nürnberg area. Each time I marvel at the changes. Sometimes they have been positive; at other times I've been dismayed by what I've seen. In 2003, however, it seems to me that all is to the good. My high school years in Fürth were good ones. The area is a much-admired old friend who continues to do well.

Museum of World Treasures

An original ten-foot long red, white and black Nazi banner is currently on display in the World War II exhibit in the Museum of World Treasures in Wichita, KS. This historical banner is on loan to the museum from the American Overseas Schools Archive (AOSA) collection of Terry D. Jorgensen, 1962 Nürnberg HS alumnus. Lt. Paul Aman confiscated the banner on April 23, 1945 from one of the Corinthian columns on the Nürnberg Stadium during the battle of Nürnberg. Terry Jorgensen is the son-in-law of Lt. Aman.

The stadium where this banner flew, also known as Zeppelin or Soldiers Field, is where the Nürnberg American High School later played their football games and hosted field and track meets from the late 1940s until the school closed in 1995.

The site is historically very special. It was here Hitler held that Adolph his gigantic. mesmerizing Nürnberg rallies. Here tens of thousand of youths, farmers, SS men, line soldiers and everyday citizens roared pledges of allegiance to their Führer. And here under hundreds of these huge swastika banners, he

> promised them, backed by the sweeping sounds of vast numbers of trumpets, a reign of German glory to last for a thousand years!

Also among the items on display at the Museum of World Treasures 'Clarence the Crusader." the hand-made suit of armor from the Bonn American HS collection in the archives (see Winter 2003 Quarterly). historical AOSA items are being prepared for loan and display in the museum.



TCK Research Materials Donated to AOS Archives

Dr. Ruth Useem, who coined the term Third Culture Kid (TCK), is donating materials related to her research on third culture families, especially TCKs, to the American Overseas Schools Archives. Dr. Useem is professor emerita from Michigan University. More than 40 years ago she and

her late husband. John Useem. began studying adults working abroad, and later began to she the focus on children. Dr. Ann Cottrell of San Diego State University, a



doctoral student of Dr. Useem's, is working with her on a study of TCKs, most of whom have attended at least one DoDDS and/or State Dept. assisted school overseas. Dr. Useem has also donated materials especially related to missionaries to the Yale Theological Library. These materials include difficult to obtain books, dissertations and theses.

We appreciate being considered as the repository for the research by Dr. Useem and others who have investigated the issues of the TCK. We encourage anyone doing research on TCKs to donate material that will then be available to others. This research will be a wonderful addition and provide outstanding research opportunities when the archive materials are finally in place and available to the public.



Eighth Annual Meeting Held in Atlanta in July

The AOSHS Flame was awarded to Lyn Baskett Fort, President of the H.H. Arnold Alumni, who has managed the AOSHS web site since its inception. Since the site began, we have added many pages and links to better meet the needs of the Society as well as the

membership. We appreciate Lyn's efforts in updating and expanding the site. Neither of our honorees could be present at the meeting, but their awards have been forwarded to them. The teachers in Wiesbaden can be very proud of these graduates.

AOSHS also presented all qualified attendees with life membership pins. If you are a life member, but were unable to attend, your pin will be mailed to you.

Two highlights of the meeting were the showing of the DoDDS 50th Anniversary video and the AOSHS Membership/Fundraising video. Due to copyright issues, the 50th Anniversary tape can only be shown at DoDDS events and is not available to the public in general. The AOSHS Membership/Fundraising video will be distributed to area representatives and alumni groups in DVD format over the course of the coming year. To explain how some of your dues are used, the rental of the equipment to show these features at the hotel was \$600. Thus, the dues of 30 members paid for these entertaining and informative features.

NAEP Scores for DoD Schools Remain High

The results of the 2003 NAEP tests in reading, administered to grades 8 and 4 nation-wide, again give high marks to the Department of Defense schools. In the total of <u>all</u> students in the U.S., DoDDS 8th graders scored highest in the nation at 273, while DDESS 8th graders were tied for 2nd with 272. The national average was 263. The 4th graders scored 4th and 5th in the nation.

For the minority students, DoDDS and DDESS African-American 8th graders scored 263 and 260, respectively (1st and 2nd in the nation). The national average was 244. DDESS and DoDDS Hispanic 8th graders scored 273 and 267, respectively (1st and 2nd in the nation). The national average was 245. DoDDS and DDESS African-American 4th grade students tied for 1st place with scores of 215. The national average was 198. DoDDS and DDESS Hispanic 4th graders tied for 2nd place with scores of 222. Fundraising Plans Progress

The present fundraising plan is for the City of Wichita, in collaboration with AOSHS, to request a Kansas U.S. Senator and Representative to sponsor identical House and Senate Bills to build the AOSHS museum and archive on city property in the Museums on the River District. The city will then request the other KS Senator and the other three KS Representatives to be Original Cosponsors of the bills.

Following this, select senators and representatives in other states, especially those who have served in the military, will be requested to cosponsor the bills. This is a lengthy legislative process when done correctly, but support from all sides has been very encouraging.

AOS Archive Seeks Grant

Joshua Yearout, AOSA archivist, is currently working on a grant proposal to present to the Kansas Humanities Council. We are asking for funds to videotape educators and alumni of overseas schools who currently live in Kansas.



These first person oral histories are an important element in telling the story of American education abroad. Linda Sekiguchi and Bruce Mitchener have agreed to conduct the interviews and do the taping. They will set up appointments throughout the state with those who have volunteered to participate. If we are successful in obtaining the Kansas grant, we will do the same in other states over the course of the next few years.

Donation Web Site Established

On July 7. AOSHS became partners with Justgive.org. That organization supports the fund raising efforts of nonprofit corporations by hosting a Web site where interested persons can find information about any organization registered with them, including AOSHS, and allows donations to be made via the Internet. It is important to note that 100% of the amount donated comes to AOSHS, there is no credit card transaction fee. This is a convenient way to donate for all members, and especially for those who are now Life members. As suggested in the February issue of the Quarterly, donating on your birthday is an easy way to remember it is time to make an annual contribution to AOSHS. Membership Dues to Increase

As announced at the membership meeting in Atlanta, annual dues for AOSHS will be increased to \$25 per year as of January 1, 2004. This increase in dues in conjunction with the annual membership drive being launched should secure the necessary funds for AOSHS to continue to grow, support archive activities and develop new projects over the next several years.

The cost of the Individual Life Membership Program (ILMP) will increase at the same time. Members are reminded that life membership can be paid in up to three installments spread over three years if they choose. Those making payments at the current rate will still pay that rate even though the final payment may be made in 2004 or 2005.

COMING SOON: Our Memories On The World Wide Web ...and more!!



The project to compile memories from former/current participants in the American Overseas Schools is in the final stage of the initial phase. This means that a design concept has been developed

for a Web based "Memories" site, a bid has been obtained to produce it, funding has been put in place, and the board of directors has given the go ahead to proceed.

The Web site will be incorporated with the current AOSHS Web site, and we will have our own icon to "click on" in order to bring up the "Memories."

- The "Memories" will be organized into decades (e.g. 1946-1959, 1960-1969, etc.).
- All of the previously gathered "Early Years Memories" will be included in the first Decade's section.
- Memories will be from former/current educators, administrators, students and anyone associated with the overseas schools.
- It will be possible to access memories by decade or an individual article in a decade.
- You will be able to print the individual article on your own computer printer by clicking on the print icon.
- Each article will contain a front page with the title, countries included in the narrative, years included in narrative, author's name, the point of view the article is written from (author is an educator, student, administrator, etc.), and the first 5 lines of the article. A picture of the author may be included if the author so desires.



MARJORIE D. WELLS (1932 - 2003)

Marjorie Doris Wells was born in New York City on July 13, 1932. She attended State University of New York in Albany where she received a Bachelor of Science degree in Education. After graduation she taught English in the Hudson Valley and in East Rochester, New York, before accepting her first assignment with DoDDS in 1961. She was a school counselor at Aschaffenburg, Germany, for 6 years. In 1967, she began a 3-year assignment teaching Jr. High English and Social Studies at Hanau. In 1970, she took a leave of absence to obtain her Master of Library Science degree at Syracuse University. Returning to Germany in 1971, she was the librarian and media specialist at Darmstadt Elementary and Middle school until her retirement in 1993. She passed away in upstate New York on June 22, 2003.

MALUTA READ (1914 - 1985)

Born and raised in Eugene, Oregon, Maluta was awarded her Bachelor's Degree from the University of Oregon and her Master's Degree from Stanford University. In 1954, after working as a psychiatric social worker in the Army Air Force during World War II, Maluta came to Kaiserslautern American High School. For the first two years she served as a dormitory counselor and then taught social studies from 1955 to 1983.

After thirty years at Kaiserslautern American High School, Maluta retired to return to the home of her childhood, where she planned to, in the words of General "Hap" Arnold, "find a rocking chair, sit down, and when I get rested, I'm going to start to rock."

JOSEPH P. IACONIS (1938 -2003)

Joe was born in the North Beach area of San Francisco and graduated from the University of San Francisco with a double major in English and Social Studies. In 1962, he began his teaching career at Luther Burbank Middle School in San Francisco. He joined DoDDS in 1967 at Bad Kreuznach HS and transferred to Kaiserslautern HS in 1968, where he remained until his death. Joe was well known for tailoring a rigorous English program for 9th graders. This program prepared many of his students for the challenges of the working world as well as future academic pursuits. He sponsored co-curricular activities such as the Science Fiction Society, a table tennis team and the National Honor Society. Joe was also deeply involved in furthering educational reforms and protecting teacher rights through his leadership roles in both the Overseas Federation of Teachers (OFT) and the Kaiserslautern Area Education Association (KAEA/OEA).
