

EXCESS YEARBOOK PROGRAM

It is ironic that AOSHS is excessing yearbooks from its archives as we simultaneously encourage donors to provide missing yearbooks. A yearbook is considered excess after AOSHS has two yearbooks from the same school for the same year in our archives. AOSHS has approximately 1,200 excess yearbooks. Concurrently, we are seeking more than 2000 yearbooks we do not have in the AOSHS archives.

The plan AOSHS has developed to provide excess yearbooks to interested parties is very simple. We will publicize the books we have to various groups that might be interested in a particular year at a particular school. If there is an interested individual that

would like an excess yearbook, we will request a \$30 donation per yearbook and then send the yearbook to their address.

The complicating factor is that AOSHS is excessing yearbooks that have been donated in good faith to the organization by loyal AOSHS supporters. We hope everyone understands that storing 1,200+ excess yearbooks is a burden we cannot assume with our limited archive space. A record of the donation will remain in the AOSHS archives and any individual notations written in the yearbook will be photographed and maintained, too.

We appreciate your understanding of this initiative.

Our contract employees had been diligently doing what they could while Kansas was under the strict orders of staying at home. As an essential business, they infrequently travelled to the office for supplies and projects. Memorabilia and artifacts are being photographed and added to our PastPerfect museum/archive database

with detailed labeling. The mountains of photographs will start to be scanned now that we are back in the AOSHS office since that is where the photo scanner is set up. This is a different piece of equipment than the yearbook scanner and requires specific handling. Some sample archival items have been loaded offline for the Board to view and discuss. The majority of visuals that will be used on the website will commence now that the contract employees can work in the office.

We plan on making all of these items accessible via the website under the Collections, sub-category "Artifacts/Memorabilia". In addition, once the AOSHS Museum and Archives "Drysdale Gallery" is complete,

everyone will be able to view it under the **Virtual Museum**. This will be similar to the Virtual Tours available at other museum sites as well as what realtors use for selling houses. We appreciate your patience on the development of these initiatives and your understanding that the current situation has slowed down our process.

CELEBRITY ESTATE TAX PLANNING MISTAKES EVERYONE CAN LEARN FROM

Spoiler Alert: Failing to Plan is Planning to Fail

Agents, managers, lawyers, financial planners...many celebrities benefit from the advice and guidance of experienced professionals in a variety of fields. But that doesn't stop some from making simple, yet all too common, mistakes, especially where their estate plans are concerned.

The musical artist Prince left behind an estate estimated to be worth \$300 million. He neglected to leave behind a will or trust. This means a court will decide how to divide his estate among his six siblings and determine whether other potential heirs have valid claims to his estate. Prince is not alone: estimates show that between 50-60% of adults also do not have a will or trust in place.

Comedian Jerry Lewis did leave a will that specified how his \$50 million estate would be settled, but that also created an issue for his heirs. A will is a public document anyone can view; as a result, dozens

of media outlets reported that Lewis had intentionally disinherited all six children from his first marriage. If Lewis had set up a trust, he could have spared his children the public embarrassment.

Actor James Gandolfini also had a will, but his failure to put effective tax planning strategies in place meant federal and state estate taxes reduced his assets significantly,

leaving his family with around half of his \$70 million estate.

Actor Heath Ledger had a will as well but failed to update it after the

birth of his daughter. When he died his estate was divided between his parents and three sisters.

Failing to update a will or estate plan after a major life event (just

like failing to update life insurance and retirement plan beneficiary designations) is a common estate planning oversight.

The reason I bring this up is as some of you may know, I discovered several clutches (nests) of dinosaur eggs from 72 million years ago from a brand

new species. As the discoverer of the species I get to name it, and I would very much like to honor that first grade teacher soooo very long ago who fostered my interest. Marie Anderson was her name at the time. Please help me find her.

He discovered the new species of dinosaur eggs at the Judith River Formation in Montana. The embryos of the eggs were analyzed and appeared to be an omnivore, exceedingly rare in dinosaurs. 




