Welcome to AOSHS 2020 -2021!



The MAN

Crawford, Maine -Dr. Dean Chapman Wiles, 87, passed away Thursday, November 5, 2020 at his home with his beloved wife, Gayle by his side. Dean was born in Norway, Maine on December 21. 1932, son of the late Kenneth R. and Helen (Snodgrass) Wiles.



During his senior year of high

school, Dean's family moved to Farmington, ME where he graduated from Farmington High School, Class of 1951. Dean attended Farmington State Teacher's College until joining the U.S. Army to serve during the time of the Korean War. He served with the 86th Infantry at Fort Riley, Kansas until his discharge in 1955. Following his service, Dean returned home to Maine and completed his Bachelor of Arts from Farmington State Teacher's College in 1957.

Dean taught school in Dixfield and Carthage until starting his career with the Department of Defense Dependents Schools in 1959. He taught school in Ansbach, Germany until returning home to earn his Master's Degree from the University of Maine at Orono, Class of 1962. Dean returned to Germany where he was a teaching principal in Illesheim. In 1964, he became the Principal of Bamberg American Elementary School, 1965 Principal of Bad Kissingen Elementary School, and 1966 Principal of Mainz, Elementary School Germany. In 1971, Dean completed his PhD in Philosophy of Education from Syracuse University in New York.

Dean's career with the DoD Dependents Schools System allowed him to live and work in Europe and Asia. In 1971 he was given a Special Assignment Coordinator position in Butzbach, Germany. He then became the Butzbach Elementary School Principal in 1972. Dean moved to Okinawa, Japan in 1974 where he was the Elementary Coordinator. In 1976 Dean became Principal at Seoul American High School. Following that assignment, he worked as the Chief School Administrator for Principals of South Korea. Returning to Germany in 1979 he was the Education Branch Chief for Curriculum for schools located in the Germany North Region and in 1982 became the Chief of the Educational Division for DoDDS Germany. During his tenure, the DoDDS Schools in Germany North and Germany South were combined. Dean had oversight of 143 schools with 78,000 students. Dean retired in 1996.

Following his retirement, Dean accompanied his wife Gayle to her leadership assignments in Okinawa, Japan, and Guam. While in Okinawa he was the DoDDS Home School liaison for the International Distance Education of Alaska. Dean was a life member and president of the education fraternity, Phi Delta Kappa (PDK), in Germany. He was Kaplan of the Year in 1984. He was PDK Chapter Member Liaison for Pacific Region A 2002-2008. He was also a member of the Association for Supervision and Curriculum Development.

Dean was predeceased by his parents. Surviving are his loving wife, Gayle Vaughn-Wiles of Crawford; his children, all of Maine, Bruce Wiles of Newburgh, Scott Wiles (Mary Ann) of Eastport, and Alison Wiles Hamlin (Tom) of Auburn; his grandchildren Tiffany Janvrin (Eugene) of Palmyra, Shannon and Allison Young, of Charlotte and Wells respectively, and Emily Hamlin-Nickulas of Merrimac MA; and his great granddaughter Chloe Young also of Charlotte Maine.

Martha Brown's DoDEA career spanned 32 years and found her in positions in DoDDS-Europe, DDESS, and DoDEA Pacific. In 1980, she began her DoDEA career teaching at Ramstein Junior High School, followed by positions at Berchtesgaden Elementary School and Kaiserslautern American High School.

Ms. Brown served as an Assistant Principal at both Kaiserslautern Elementary School and Kaiserslautern American High School before being promoted to Principal of Augsburg High School. Her other principalships include Kaiserslautern American High School, Heidelberg High School and Lejeune High School. She was honored to be selected the DoDEA Secondary Principal of the Year in 1997.

At the above-school level, Ms. Brown served in the DoDDS-Europe Area Office as a Supervisory Education Specialist for four years, was the Community Superintendent of Fort Campbell Schools for four years, and the Okinawa District Superintendent for four years. Before leaving the Pacific Area for DoDEA Headquarters, she was asked to serve as the Acting Director of DoDEA Pacific for a year.


Ms. Brown earned a BA in English from Limestone College, and MEd in English from North Georgia University, and an EdS in educational leadership from Converse College.

She retired to her native South Carolina where she and her husband enjoy the low country lifestyle and are active in several community service organizations. Their son and daughter-in-law are both proud graduates of DoDEA.

ALLEN HAYMON

A native Kentuckian, **Allen Haymon**'s undergraduate degree was earned from Kentucky State University, Frankfort, Kentucky, and his master's from Spaulding University, Louisville, Kentucky. In 1972 Allen left his teaching position in Louisville and joined DoDDS as a teacher at Zweibruecken Elementary School # 1, Zweibruecken, Germany. In 1975, he was assigned to the position of Teacher Assistant Principal of the school. Allen later served as Principal of a small school in Zweibruecken (1978-1981), Assistant Principal of Kaiserslautern Elementary #1 (1981-1983) and in 1983, coming full circle, returned to Zweibruecken Elementary #1, (later renamed Kreuzberg Elementary) as Principal. He assumed the position of coordinator for the staff development program, The Study of Teaching, DoDDS-North Germany Regional Office in 1990.

Allen was selected as the Leadership Development Coordinator in the Professional Development and Education Equity Division, DoDEA in 1995. He later held the position of Education Equity Training Specialist and Chief, Professional Development. Allen retired from DoDEA in 2005. Three years later he returned to DoDEA as a reemployed annuitant for the purpose of redesigning leadership development for the school system.



Allen and his wife Connie reside in Spotsylvania County, VA (Fredericksburg). She is retired from her position in the Logistics Division, DoDEA. Their daughters are DoDDS graduates: Nicole (Zweibruecken HS) and Jaclynn (Kaiserslautern HS).

Frank E. Roehl received his Bachelor of Science in Physical Education & Coaching from the University of Nebraska, Lincoln (1970) and his Masters in Human Services Delivery in Education Administration from Boston University (1983). Frank retired from DoDEA in July 2018 after 48 years of Federal Service. He served as the Superintendent of Schools for the DoDEA Europe West District, Superintendent of the Isles District and Heidelberg District, Assistant Superintendent of the Bavaria District, Assistant Superintendent and Acting Superintendent of the Heidelberg District, DoDDS Middle Level Coordinator, and a principal, assistant principal, classroom teacher and coach at elementary through high school levels with assignments in Germany and Turkey. Frank served as the Germany Vice President and DoDDS Worldwide President of the Federal Managers Association, Chapter 135 for four years.

AOSHS continues to seek donations of artifacts, memorabilia, publications, yearbooks and photographs from students that attended DoDDS schools and from teachers and administrators that worked in these schools. I would

like to share with you a recent "good news" story of how AOSHS continues to complete the gaps in our archives.

The H.H. Arnold High School (Wiesbaden)
Information Specialist has agreed to send us the yearbooks in the school's Information
Center. The yearbooks will be scanned and returned to the school.
After this initiative is complete, we will have every yearbook from Wiesbaden from 1948

through 2020, except for 1993, 1995 and 2015. We recently completed a similar endeavor with **Ramstein High School**. AOSHS is currently working with **Zama HS**, **Misawa HS**, **Vicenza HS**. and the **W**. **T**.

Sampson school in Cuba to obtain their resources.

As you know, AOSHS has over 2,300 yearbooks available on their website and will add an additional 1,000 yearbooks soon. The first



4,000 digital photographs are now online through the AOSHS website. We have over 60,000 more to digitize and place online. None of this is possible without your efforts to provide us your artifacts,

memorabilia, publications, yearbooks, and photographs.

The following article is based on materials that we have in the AOSHS archives. There are treasures about our history in each box that we open. Many of us will be able to relate to the description of Ms. Baker's life and service.

Ms. Baker celebrated her 103rd birthday this past September.

A SPECIAL FORCES LEGEND



On November 5, 2014 Ms. Doris Baker was inducted as an **Honorary Member of the Special** Forces Regiment. She was recognized for her 20 years of service with the 1/10th Special Forces Group (Green Berets). As they tipped their berets to make her one of their own, Miss Baker joined the ranks of a select category. She is one of only nine other distinguished individuals worldwide, and one of only three women to ever receive this elite membership. Honorary membership in the Special Forces Regiment is rare and given only to select civilians who have contributed to the welfare, advanced the interests, and served as role models for the regiment. Ms. Baker was also presented with a certificate of recognition stating that she was the first USDESEA (now DoDEA) employee ever to have been given Honorary Membership in the Regiment. She was also awarded a coveted Silver Honorary Life Membership from Special Forces Chapter 65, Bad Toelz, Germany, Flint Kaserne Chapter.

Ms. Baker's service to her nation during the Cold War played out behind the scenes. Unlike publicly celebrated military and political heroes who helped maintain peace and security in Europe, Doris was among fellow Department of Defense civilian employees whose dedication to soldiers and their families serving on the frontiers of freedom never achieved notoriety beyond their communities. Their efforts, however, made a vital difference to the readiness and wellbeing of the forces.



While serving as a teacher in Michigan, Doris heard about better pay and a world of adventure in overseas teaching opportunities. She

signed up, thinking she was going to be sent to Japan. Instead, she was sent to Germany where, from 1950 to 1979, she served the DoD with great distinction as a teacher and principal of the U.S. Army Elementary and Junior High Schools in Flint Kaserne, Bad Toelz, Germany, the first overseas assignment base for the 1/10th Special Forces Group Airborne (Green Berets) located near one of the largest SS training camps. During her tenure in Bad Toelz, Doris established and led a highquality educational program in a remote location and under unique circumstances, playing a key role in an unwritten chapter in the history of American education – the overseas education of more than

four million American children since World War II.

Her outreach, mentorship, counseling and friendship to students, parents, the command, and the entire Army community benefitted thousands who passed through the gates of Flint Kaserne. For more than 30 years, Doris adopted the Green Berets as her own, calling them "her lads." The original 10th Special Forces Group continued to remain in Doris' heart throughout her life, and she later assisted in the acquisition and preservation of archives, photos and memorabilia for the Airborne & **Special Operations Museum** Foundation at Fayetteville, North Carolina. In order to keep the legacy of the 10th alive, she also has spoken to various military

groups, and incoming commanders and their spouses on the topic of Special Forces history.

Her experiences of living among the first Special Forces Group in Europe served as the basis for Doris' book The Originals, the first book about the Green Berets written by a woman. Her book chronicles an American woman caught in the dangerous lives and fortunes of these extraordinary men. Her adventures in Europe put her directly in the path of history, including close-call border crossings, a face-to-face encounter with Hitler's last active general, and put her in possession of personal photographs of Hitler. Her extensive travels and freelance photography assignments after World War II



were blended into her book, <u>I'll Let</u> <u>You Know When We Get There</u>.

Miss Baker's legacy of service and adventure inspires all who have been touched by her and her work and continues to live on through the lives of her students, colleagues, and friends whom she continues to influence around the world.

The AOSHS Virtual Memorial and Commemorative Program should be up and running soon. Our November 2020 AOSHS Board approved the name of the program and after the web designers finish the upcoming School Histories and

Memories project, the Virtual Memorial and Commemorative Program will be next in line. Our website continues to grow. If you haven't visited the website at www.aoshs.org please do so. You will be amazed!

The Memorial Program and Commemorative Tile Program have been part of the backbone of supporting funds that preserves our AOSHS legacy. As I mentioned in

the Fall 2020 AOSHS Quarterly, the Virtual Memorial and Commemorative Program will be similar to the previous Memorial Program and the Commemorative Tile Program. The bricks and pavers originally intended for another AOSHS building in Wichita, KS are now quarry and granite tiles mounted on the inside walls of our new AOSHS headquarters. We still have a small number of tiles left that can be purchased. Forms for each are located at the end of this newsletter:

The Virtual Memorial and Commemorative Program will have a system of donations similar to the old programs and will be uploaded on our AOSHS website.

- ♦ Tier 1 Three lines, 36*
 letters per line (\$100)
- Tier 2 Six lines, 36* letters per line and photo (\$250)
- Tier 3 Six lines, 36* letters per line and photo and link to a 250-word biography (\$500)
- ♦ Tier 4 Video, pictures, collage, or slideshow, 25 MB (\$2000)

* The number of letters may change depending upon the configuration of the web space.

Memorials

One of the advantages of the Virtual Memorial Program is that member sponsors will now begin with a \$25 initial donation to honor a friend or colleague, have it announced in the AOSHS Quarterly then entered into the website as "Those No Longer With Us." When others want to add to the memorial, the sponsor can then enhance the original submission into a Tier 1 level donation (\$100), and if more friends

and family gather donations, you could progress to another Tier and add a picture, biography or 25mg of a slide show/movie.

Commemoratives

The Virtual Commemorative Program begins at Tier 1 (\$100) and is a unique way for teachers, administrators, staff, and BRATS to have remembrances posted in our DoDDS, DoDEA history overseas. Some retirees may like to be remembered for their years of service. Teacher and BRATS reunion groups both past and present can record their milestones with a commemorative listing. The possibilities are endless and because it is virtual, timeless.




