This is what "Our Mission" states. As a result, the **AOSHS Museum and Archives** will officially open on Thursday, 15 April 2021. The Museum Committee and the entire AOSHS Board have been working tirelessly toward this goal for some years.

Thanks to the generosity of our membership plus the quantity and quality of memorabilia on hand in Wichita, we are now able to prepare the AOSHS Museum...YOUR museum...for a public opening and ongoing visitation. This has been no easy task. Did you know that AOSHS employs an archivist who examines and catalogs each

item that is sent to us? His meticulous work has helped to make it possible to know WHAT we have and WHERE to find it. Thanks to Adam Gossman's efforts, the Museum Committee will be establishing the initial display for the Museum, which will cover various DoDDS locations around the world and grade level inclusivity.

- **Kevin Frutiger** is in charge of the extensive AOSHS Yearbook Collection. Many AOSHS members, and former teachers and students donate yearbooks to the AOSHS collection. You can check the AOSHS website to see which yearbooks we have on hand at the Museum and which ones we still need. Cooperation between other organizations and individuals allows for "loans" of yearbooks; in this situation, the books are sent to AOSHS, photographed, and then returned to the owner. Yearbooks are the most requested/searched item from the AOSHS Museum and Archives.
- **Chris Limes** is responsible for photographing items that have been donated to AOSHS. In addition, the photographs are also digitized, along with slides and documents; the processed images can then be displayed on the AOSHS website. A recent project has included putting opening and closing dates of DoDDS schools onto our website.
- Monica Maack Tiller is our Office Operations Manager. She handles the day-to-day operation of the Office, Museum and Archives. It is Monica who will greet you as you enter the door on Douglas Street in Wichita. It is Monica who answers the phone and the questions which come from all over the country. Monica keeps the organization running and helps to keep all of us focused.

And what exactly do our Board Members do? As you read this edition of the AOSHS Quarterly, you will gain insight as to what their

volunteer efforts entail. Be sure to read each article. There is invaluable information on the Board's efforts to "grow" the organization and our collection. Whether it's the Endowment Fund, web page, museum opening, memorial program, history of AOSHS and our schools, yearbook initiative, or the many invaluable "memories" shared by our Board and our members...YOU!

ARTIFACTS, MEMORABILIA, PUBLICATIONS, YEARBOOKS & PHOTOGRAPHS



ESTABLISHMENT OF THE AOSHS ENDOWMENT FUND WITH DEEPEST THANKS TO LINDA HIEBERT SEKIGUCHI

Now that we are on the eve of opening the AOSHS Museum and Archives, the Board of Directors has approved the establishment of the **AOSHS Endowment Fund**. The goal of the AOSHS Endowment Fund is to build an asset that will produce income for the organization for many years to come. The capital in the Endowment Fund will only be used for emergencies.

Donations will not be solicited from individuals exclusively for the Endowment Fund, but we may market the Endowment Fund to corporate and organizational donors. One exception to this was made when **Dr. Gayle Vaughn-Wiles** asked people who wanted to contribute to AOSHS in honor of the passing of her husband, **Dr. Dean Wiles**, to mark their contributions for the endowment fund.

The Board decided to move a percentage of our contributions to the Endowment Fund each year. The Board will determine what percentage of all donations will be placed in the Endowment Fund annually and under what conditions income from the Fund may be withdrawn.

AOSHS recently received an incredible gift from the estate of **Linda Hiebert Sekiguchi**. The Board decided to use this legacy to start the Endowment Fund. Linda's obituary was provided in the Fall 2019 edition of the *AOSHS Quarterly*. She taught elementary school in Topeka, Kansas, then joined the Department of Defense Dependent Schools (DoDDS) in Mannheim, Germany. She also taught with DoDDS in the Philippines and in Frankfurt, Germany before returning home.

The AOSHS Board of Directors is extremely grateful to Linda Hiebert Sekiguchi for her substantial donation to the organization. We will benefit from her generosity for many years to come.

BYRON E. SMITH

September 20, 1933-January 01, 2021

Coach Byron Smith, formerly of Berlin High School (1969-1977) and Wiesbaden High School (1983-1992), died on January 1, 2021. He was 87 years old. Originally from Bellingham, Washington, Byron enlisted in the U.S. Navy in 1950 and served aboard the troop transport U.S.S. Noble where he was a signalman and LST driver. He was involved in U.S. Army and Marine amphibious landing operations on the Korean peninsula during the Korean War. Following his discharge from the Navy, Byron attended Western Washington State College where he earned a teaching degree. Following several teaching assignments in Washington, Byron entered the Department of Defense Dependent School system where he and his family lived in Newfoundland, Japan, the Azores, and Germany. An Industrial Arts teacher and coach, Byron was a very successful basketball, football, and track coach. During his tenure at Berlin High School, Coach Smith led the Berlin Cubs boys' basketball team to 7 consecutive conference championships. Later, as the head football and basketball coach at Wiesbaden High School, Coach

Smith led the Wiesbaden Warriors to several football and basketball conference championships. When he retired from teaching in 1992 Coach Smith was one of the winningest basketball coaches in DoDDS history. First retiring to Ft. Walton Beach, Florida,



Byron and Margaret Smith moved to Villa Rica, Georgia in 2005 where they have lived until his death.

Teacher, School Administrator 1972-1995

The day that I walked into Zweibruecken ES #1 and met John Romeo, the principal, was the beginning of what turned into a fantastic 23-year educational experience. I remember that following that meeting we began the search for a place to live. A few days later we met a landlord in the village of Kirrberg who had a unit beneath his Gasthaus that was available. On the first night in our new home, we noticed there were no shades or blinds covering the windows. Resourcefully, we covered all windows with sheets. A few days later, an American friend of our landlord came to meet us. The landlord had noticed the sheets and had asked her to stop in and show us the built in rouladens that you lowered and raised. This was just the beginning of our education on living in Germany. Our landlords were great. They would come down and escort our three-year-old daughter up to the Gasthaus where she would feast on schnitzel, pomme frites and other menu items until we rescued her. We continued to dine there years after moving to a new location. The older residents of the village were especially curious about my wife's Afro and wondered how her hair was supported. We were told that some thought it was

supported by something underneath. One day an older resident while talking to my wife reached up and squeezed her hair. Curiosity satisfied.

The teachers at Zweibruecken ES#1 were a close knit and outgoing group. They were involved in the military community through activities such as the local theater, bazaars, and holiday activities. There were many dinner gatherings that extended into France, a short drive from the school. I loved the school, the teachers, and the community. Frauline Zutter and Frau Lacroix, our wonderful local national teachers, immersed our students in the German culture as much as possible. Study trips to cities like Trier, connected with an excursion on the Mosel River, topped off by lunch in Bernkastel -Kues were so educational and fun. As a teacher and school administrator I recognized the dedication of the teachers. You could pass the building on weekends and see their cars in the parking lot. They did not hesitate when asked to assist in school related activities as well as those that were non-school related. We were the surrogate family away from home. A few weeks before my second child was born. I was summoned to the library where I was surprised with a staff organized baby shower.

In addition to the language there were other "things" new to us; for instance shops that closed on Tuesday at noon, restaurants that did not open on certain days, not being able to shop on Sundays, buying meats in one shop, and bread in another. We adapted and developed our own routines, going to the market in the downtown area on Saturday and buying flowers and other items from the local booths, and stopping in for coffee at our favorite Kaffeehaus. On other Saturdays we would drive to Kaiserslautern, Ramstein Airbase, Heidelberg, or Frankfurt to shop at the larger base exchanges.

We were able to travel to cities and visit sights that we never thought we would see. Who would not love seeing the tulip fields of Holland, driving through the alps, spending weekends at the Oktoberfest and wine fests, enjoying a Rudesheimer coffee in Rudesheim, strolling the streets of Paris, lying on the beaches of Italy, or attending plays in London and Vienna? So many wonderful memories. So many wonderful people.






