Both Chris and his wife, Chrystie, have been working part time in our office while a new Office Manager selection process has been underway.


During our November Board of Directors meeting at the AOSHS museum, Board members spent focused time visioning what the future of AOSHS could be and planning for that future. Jamey Hansen, CIO for the College of Liberal Arts at the University of Minnesota, facilitated the sessions. Jamey, son of former DoDDS educators, brought eight years of experience in the DoDDS system as a student and a wealth of expertise in facilitation at the university to his role.

AOSHS accomplished a long-awaited-and-planned-for goal with the opening of the new museum last April. The Board recognized that now is the time to identify

new goals that will strengthen and grow the organization and keep it on a successful path for the future. Initially, we spent time identifying our recognized and potential members, audience, and partners. We defined over twenty-five specific groups, ranging from past and present educators and students to military services and military-affiliated organizations to universities, colleges, and historians. AOSHS has something to offer each of these groups, and they each have something to offer AOSHS.

The Board identified several initial priorities: updating our business plan to reflect steps for the way ahead; expanding the use of social media to communicate the AOSHS story to multiple audiences; identifying additional revenue streams; establishing partnerships with military-connected organizations, contractors, and civic organizations; and, of course, continuing to support the AOSHS membership.

The Board expressed commitment to moving forward with these initial priorities. The outlook for AOSHS is bright. So, stand by for new developments in the upcoming months as AOSHS grows its vision for the future.

IT'S TIME TO LEAVE YOUR FOOTPRINT

The recent flights into space made me think about the one that happened, June 16,1969, when the first astronauts landed on the moon and memorialized their landing by leaving footprints.

As DoDDS teachers, administrators, and "Brats" we have walked in places that very few will ever get to visit. Some of us have been privy to extraordinary historical times: the **breakup of the Berlin Wall**, the **tsunami in Thailand**, and the eruption **of Mt. Pinatubo in the Philippines** just to name a few. Then there are the memories. I'm sure you, like I, have thousands of memories and stories of people who have been extraordinary, students who have touched our lives, and the experience of living in a community of dedicated military professionals.

Several sites on social media are hosted by DoDDS people and Brats. Many of the entries are about people who have passed and people they're trying to find. DoDDS does not keep a public record of people. The closest thing that we have on an ongoing basis is the AOSHS website that works hard at "Preserving our legacy."

During the past year, AOSHS developed a new addition to the website called **Remembrances**. Like the **Original Kiosk** (still accessible on the website), Remembrances is a virtual place to store your history and leave your DoDDS footprint. You can write down the places and dates you were with the DoDDS community or commemorate reunions, graduations and retirements. In addition, you can establish a **Memorial** for a DoDDS friend.

IN MEMORIAM

MARTHA BROWN

ALAN FAVA

October 13, 1947 – November 25, 2020



Alan Fava was born on the 13th of October of 1947 in Greenville, Mississippi. His parents were Opel Nell Brown and Malio Fava. He graduated from St. Joseph Catholic School. From there he attended Delta State University for a year and then transferred to the University of Southern Mississippi in Hattiesburg, where he received both his graduate and undergraduate degrees.

In 1974, he moved from Hattiesburg to Rolling Fork, Mississippi and married Charla Robinson who was a teacher in his hometown. They spent a year there where he was an elementary principal. The next year, they were able to move back to Greenville, with jobs in the Public School System. Six years later, their son Christopher was born. In 1984, they were hired by DoDDS for their first assignment in Kitzingen, Germany. That was their home for the next 23 years.

In 2007, Alan retired to The Woodlands, Texas, where he lived until his death on November 25, 2020 after a very short battle with lung cancer that had only been diagnosed two months prior. He leaves behind a sister, Margaret Reginer of Benton, Arkansas, and one son, Christopher of Austin, Texas.



DR. ARLYN GORDON SWEENEY

July 31, 1922 – September 2, 2021

Dr. Arlyn Gordon Sweeney, longtime (retired) teacher, administrator, and senior leader in the DoD Schools passed away on September 2, 2021, at the age of 99.

She was born in Chicago on July 31, 1922. Arlyn graduated from Cardozo High School in Washington, DC and then attended the District of Columbia Teachers College, graduating with a BA in Social Studies in 1942.

Dr. Sweeney was married for 62 years to Maj (Retired- USAF) Howard E. Sweeney, who died in 2004. They had three children: Patrick, Shawn, and Sharyn.

From 1951-54, she was a teacher in Sacramento, CA. In 1954, Arlyn served as a head teacher at the dependents school in Scotia North, RAF Burtonwood (United Kingdom) where she and her husband were stationed until 1956.





From 1956-1957, she taught in Baltimore, MD, before moving to Edwards AFB California, where she served as an educator and administrator in the Muroc Unified School District until 1968.

In addition to her DoD service in the United Kingdom, Dr. Sweeney served in the Pacific, at HQ in Alexandria (VA), and in Europe (Wiesbaden, Germany). She served in several key positions, listed to the right.

Dr. Sweeney earned a M.A. in Education from California State University (1956) and a Doctorate in Education from the University of Southern California in 1978. She retired from DoDEA in August 1995 and returned to Washington, DC.



CHRIS LIMES

Thirty-two years ago, I was standing in the office of Rose Hill High School, a small school located near Wichita, Kansas. The school secretary had asked me to come to the office to take a phone call. During the phone conversation, I was offered a position to teach science at Zweibrücken, Germany. I had interviewed for a teaching position with the Department of Defense Dependents Schools nearly two years earlier. With the passing of time, I presumed that teaching overseas for DoDDS was not in my future. You can imagine how surprised I was to receive the offer. That evening, my wife Chrystie and I had a relatively short discussion about whether we should uproot our family and accept the teaching position. Well, seven weeks later, we arrived in Germany where we were immediately welcomed by our DoDDS family of colleagues. They opened up their homes, provided us with transportation, and guided us through our transition to living in a foreign country. Chrystie and I were not used to being so dependent on others. When we lamented about asking for assistance, we were told not to worry. Eventually, everyone gets a chance to return the favor by supporting new arrivals. Looking back, I realize how this tradition fostered many lifelong friendships and promoted a sense of community.

Working for DoDDS, I finally felt like I was being paid a decent wage for doing something that I loved, sharing the world of biology and chemistry with my students. Before accepting the teaching position with DoDDS, I came close to accepting a job working for a pharmaceutical company. I am not sure how that would have turned out, but working for DoDDS worked out great!

Our two sons, Ryan and Collin, were taught by knowledgeable and professional people from kindergarten through high school. Sure, the field trips to castles and museums in Paris were wonderful, and they enriched their lives in ways that would not have been possible if we had stayed in Kansas. More importantly, they developed friendships with other children from all over the United States and the rest of the world. Our boys developed an awareness of the differences that exist between cultures but at the same time they understood that they had so many things in common. My wife and I are so grateful for the education and experiences that DoDDS provided our children. You just cannot put a price tag on this.

Zweibrücken Air Base was one of the first military installations to close with the fall of the Berlin Wall. Like dominoes, many more installations closed. Hundreds of DoDDS schools closed too as you know. We would only have the memories of those schools if it weren't for the actions of our founder, Mr. Tom Drysdale. The American Overseas Schools Historical Society owes its existence to this gentleman, who began collecting and storing artifacts and memorabilia of schools

that closed in his basement. His vision to preserve the legacy of DoDDS schools has come a long way. Under the guidance of the AOSHS volunteer board of directors and the generous donations of our members, we have a wonderful museum and archives in Wichita, Kansas. It is a top shelf museum and includes a digital studio where items are scanned and made available on our website. I hope that you will be able to visit us here in Wichita so you can see for yourself the pieces of our unique history that are on display. If you cannot make it to Wichita, please check out our website at www.aoshs.org where you can view the thousands of yearbooks and artifacts that are featured.

After retiring in 2016, Chrystie and I returned to Wichita, Kansas. Living here has made it possible for us to work at AOSHS. In fact, it has given us an opportunity to "give back" to the organization that literally changed our lives.






