The **AOHS Board** continues to focus on the new and improved **AOSHS Business Plan** as the driving focus for our way forward. The specific eight goals and objectives are our guideposts, and we aim to be diligent in establishing and executing plans to address them by the ascribed dates. There is much work to be done.

One goal—a letter writing campaign focusing on potential donors – has the potential to garner support from individuals, business, and corporations who are not currently familiar with AOSHS and our mission. By the end of 2022 we expect to have identified and contacted at least 50 entities whose support we believe could benefit our Museum and Archives. The Board is committed to following through with this goal and excited about its potential impact.

Another goal—increasing our exposure and visibility in specifically identified venues—is one the Board is grappling with. On the "to do" list is strategically identifying locations, which items to show and share, how to best showcase them, and logistically how to share. HIGH SCHOOL YEARBOOK INITIATIVE

AOSHS has access to over 4400 school yearbooks or publications. Over 3400 of these can be viewed online through the AOSHS website. We are continuing to scan these resources and expect to have the additional 1000 yearbooks online by 2024.

The initiative to obtain yearbooks from existing high schools began almost 18 months ago. As a result, of the 40 high schools that exist today, we have received yearbooks from 27 of them. We hope to obtain 200 to 300 more yearbooks by the end of the summer when the push for this initiative will end.

Beginning this fall, DoDEA and AOSHS will begin a similar initiative to obtain and place on-line yearbooks or publications from existing elementary and middle schools. Today there are 95 DoDEA elementary and middle schools throughout the world. We expect to receive more than 2000 yearbooks/publications from these schools for this initiative.

With the current inventory of 4400 yearbooks, the additional 300 from the current initiative and the projected suc-

cess of the elementary/middle school initiative, AOSHS should be nearing 8000 publications online within the next two to three years.

These two initiatives focus on existing schools. We are still missing yearbooks or publications from hundreds of schools that have closed. Dating back to the 1946, here have been more than 725 DoDEA schools. There are currently 135 schools. This means there are almost 600 schools that have closed.

THIS IS WHY WE NEED YOU (STUDENTS, TEACHERS, AND ADMINISTRATORS) TO PROVIDE AOSHS MATERIALS FROM THESE 600 SCHOOLS. The window is quickly closing on the opportunity to obtain materials from the late 40's and the 50's. With your support, it is possible to make the AOSHS collection more complete.

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

The American Overseas Schools Historical Society (AOSHS) has awarded \$7,500 in scholarships to 2022 graduates of the DODEA education system.

THREE \$1,500 Dr. Tom Drysdale Memorial Scholarships went to overseas small school seniors Nathan Pierce (Brussels HS - Belgium), Arianna Bedard (Osan HS - S. Korea), and Mollie Quill (WT Sampson HS - Cuba). Additionally, working with Kaiserslautern alumni, TWO additional \$1,500 scholarships were awarded to K-Town seniors: Kiera Kelly & Alex Price.



MARILYNN RUTH AYERS TAYLOR

June 4, 1935 – October 18, 2021



Marilynn Ruth Ayers Taylor, born on June 4, 1935, in Marion, Indiana, passed away on October 18, 2021, at her home in San Antonio, Texas. She was preceded in death by her parents, Martha Helen Tormohlen and John Howard Ayers. She is survived by her beloved husband Terrell Taylor; her sister Patricia Ayers Burd and her husband John of Gainesville, Georgia; her stepchildren Kent Taylor and his wife Yvonne of Las Vegas, Nevada, and Melora Taylor Magill and her husband Bryan of San Antonio; and her nieces Catherine Burd Davis (husband Jeff) of Charlotte, North Carolina and Emily Burd Webster (husband Daryl) of Gainesville, Georgia and their children Jeffrey, John, Stephen and Tristen Davis; Elizabeth, John and Rebecca Webster. Marilynn grew up in Greenville, Illinois graduating from Greenville High School in 1953 and Greenville College (now University) in 1957. She taught in Beloit, Wisconsin and St. Louis, Missouri before following her urge to travel by joining

the Department of Defense Dependents Schools System as a librarian/media specialist. She worked in schools in Japan, the Philippines, Germany, and Turkey and took full advantage of the opportunities to explore Europe, Asia, Australia, and Africa. The best discovery in all her travels was finding Terry. They were married on Dec. 20, 1971, in Greenville. Wherever they lived, their home was always open to friends and family. Her warm hospitality made guests feel welcome and special. They loved sharing their part of the world with visitors, taking them to historic locations and to special out-of-the-way shopping places. Marilynn was the ultimate great guide; she could find her way through winding, unmarked streets in cities or villages and back roads in the countryside.

Besides work, travel, and entertaining guests, Marilynn also managed to be involved in elected positions in the Overseas Education Association and sang in German church choirs in Kaiserslautern and Osterholz.

Retirement in 1993 meant moving again, this time to Boerne, Texas. Marilynn immediately became involved in the community. She joined the First United Methodist Church of Boerne and quickly became part of the choir. She volunteered in the church office and at the Boerne Public Library. The transition to their home at the Villa de San Antonio was no different. She and Terry provided hours of work in the library. Marilynn served in leadership roles at the Villa, and when she wasn't doing volunteer work, she was probably reading or watching the Spurs. Her positive outlook on life and willingness to be of help to others endeared her to residents and staff alike.

Guided by her faith and motivated by her love for her family and friends, Marilynn has left a meaningful legacy to all who knew her.



ANSWERS: 1. The first year that Asmara American School was open, it was named Robert E. Lee Dependent School. The next year the school was referred to as Asmara American School. The school was located on an Air Force installation in Asmara, Ethiopia. The area where the school was located is now in the country of Eritrea. 2. Decimomannu Elementary School was located on the island of Sardinia, Italy. In 1986, Gary Flannery and his wife, Diane, were hired to open the small two teacher school for the Americans 3. Seville American High School was originally part of Seville Dependents School. Its original name was Washington Irving School after the American writer who had been an American ambassador to Spain. After one year the school was renamed Seville School and then Seville High School. 4. Originally, the elementary school in Bermuda was known as Kindley Elementary School which opened in 1947 with grades K-8. In 1969, a new school was dedicated as Robert B. Chaffee Elementary School. Often when a base changed from one branch of service to another the school was renamed. 5. Women's sports become part of the DoDDS competitive sports program for school year 1973-74. Prior to that time, the Girls' Athletic Association was the only venue for girls' sports, and events were only at the local level. The change was due to the passage of Title IX legislation that prohibited sex-based discrimination in any school or any other education program that received federal funding. 6. The first school for American students in Ankara, Turkey, was the Ankara American Education Association which opened for its first session of school on October 16, 1950. The school had one hundred twenty children, ranging from kindergarten through ninth grade with eight teachers, one of whom served as the principal. 7. Ciğli Elementary School was located in the housing area of Ciğli Air Force Base. The air base served as an American Air Base, a Turkish Air Base and the commercial airport for Izmir until a new airport was constructed. 8. The Turkish meaning of the Hodia is teacher. The people around the world know him as the man who rode his donkey backward to see the world from a different light. He can see where he has been, rather than where he is going. The Turks know him as a hero. According to a school yearbook, the students of Incirlik High reflected the Hodja through their individuality and their humorous outlook on life. In spite of constant change that goes with being a military member, lasting friendships were formed, and the prestige of being a Hodja would never be forgotten. 9. The SHAPE schools were established as a result of the move of SHAPE from France to Belgium in April 1967. The schools derive their organizational structure from an agreement between the Belgium government and the Supreme Commander Allied Forces Europe. This agreement provides for an international school board responsible for the organization and administration of the SHAPE schools. The board is composed of one representative from each of the NATO nations with children in the schools. National school units are sponsored by Belgium, Canada, Holland, Italy, Norway, United Kingdom, United States and Germany. 10. Coevorden American Elementary School was located in the city of Coevorden, The Netherlands, six kilometers from the German border in the northeast province of Drenthe. The school was in the center of the city and occupied a 1985 addition of four classrooms to Parkschool, a Dutch elementary school which shared its gymnasium, library and art room with the Americans. The staff for the 1987-88 school year consisted of four classroom teachers, one of whom is also the special education teacher, an educational aide, a secretary and a principal.

Adam Hildenbrand — Part II

BELOVED TEACHER

Adam Hildenbrand—Lifelong student and educator. A teacher in the classroom and educator in the lessons of life.

Many Berlin American High School students remember Mr. Hildenbrand as a math teacher from the late 1960's to 1994, where he taught Algebra, Trigonometry, and Calculus. Later he also taught the Cooperative Work Experience program. His passion in the classroom and personal interest in his students defined the man who is both a teacher and a friend.

I enjoyed many long conversations with Mr. Hildenbrand over the years during Berlin American High School reunions and periodic phone calls. We share a kindred spirit that became an encouragement to me. Mr. Hildenbrand is an inspiration as a young man who persevered under hardship in Yugoslavia after WWII, before his emigration to the United States with his family in 1952.

Mr. Hildenbrand spoke with heartfelt mourning recalling his family hardships in the Yugoslavia Concentration Camp "Rdolfsgnad," located in what is now northern Serbia.
Rdolfsgnad translates as
"Rudolph's grace, although
Adam said it certainly wasn't
anything like heavenly grace that
he knew. Rdolfsgnad was the
largest of the eight liquidation
camps for ethnic Germans during
1944-1948 under the communist
leadership of Emperor Tito, who
invaded the area after the Nazis
were defeated at the end of
World War II.

Adam also spoke of his passion for learning and his degree in mathematics and education from Bradley University in 1962. He recalled his training in the Army as a Medic where his expertise in math was also recognized and how he eventually transitioned to positions in base finance and accounting offices at posts in Virginia and Korea.

This testimony from Joe Koffley, BAHS'70-72 is a fitting tribute to his significant and lasting impact in the classroom and in our lives: "I met Mr. Hildenbrand in 1971 having moved from Miami, Florida to Berlin. He was my Algebra I and Geometry teacher. In actual point of fact, he was far, far more than that and he has been much in my thoughts after I left Berlin only two years later.

To be perfectly clear, before arriving in Berlin, I was not a stellar math student (third string to be sure) and I had an abysmal lack of self-confidence. In the short span of two years, Mr. Hildenbrand saw potential in me and instilled a true love of mathematics that has carried me throughout my engineering career for nearly forty years.

His encouragement took me from academic ignominy to the National Honor Society, and later, serving as his teaching assistant. Mr. Hildenbrand inspired me to look far ahead to the future when many others lived for the moment. I left Berlin with a confidence and determination to succeed, no matter the degree of adversity. Make no mistake, the life lessons he instilled in me extended well beyond simply mathematics.

Mr. Hildenbrand and I traded some emails in the early 2000s. In 2019 I finally got to see him again at the Columbus, Ohio regional reunion. To say it was an emotional moment for me would be a terrible understatement. Words cannot adequately express the depth of my gratitude to him.

An old phrase comes to mind that success is having the good fortune to stand on the shoulders of giants. I have stood upon many giants' shoulders; however, Mr. Hildenbrand ranks as the first giant to me.

We discussed Daniel's testimony before King Nebuchadnezzar—to be more about believing than being. He said we should dare to be a Daniel. We should dare to stand alone. We should dare to have a purpose firm. We should dare to make it known. Thanks for

blessing me with this powerful message.

Adam Hildenbrand's life as an educator extended well beyond the classroom. He led a life of significance! To that we express our good cheer and gratitude—Huzzah! Well done good and faithful servant.

Adam and his late wife Mary Ellen (Higgins) had two daughters-Kathleen and Mary. Mary Ellen taught at TAR Elementary school in Berlin. Kathleen graduated from BAHS. She is currently a beautician in Columbus, Ohio. Mary has a PhD in Psychology and is a counselor in Cleveland, Ohio. Mary is married and has two children.
