Of note this fall on 30 August, the Pentagon opened a special display

DoDEA extended an invitation to the AOSHS Board to represent the thousands of teachers dedicated to this task over the decades. Of note, in addition to our teachers, one of the first students educated in a DoDDS Pacific school was in attendance. It was wonderful to be included and to represent all DoDDS teachers for the work that has been done for generations of military students.

AOSHS would like to thank Mr. Tom Brady, DoDEA Director; Mr. Will Griffin; and Mr. Frank O'Gara (retired) for including AOSHS in this important event. The recognition of the hard work of DoDDS teachers for so many decades is very appreciated. For DoDDS teachers and students to be celebrated in such a public way in the Pentagon is beyond description.

It should be noted that AOSHS was asked and provided input and

photographs for inclusion in this display.

Additionally, the Pentagon ceremony attendees visited the National Museum of the US Army. We met with both the Chief Curator and the Assistant Curator. We came away with fresh ideas for our AOSHS Museum in Wichita. Importantly, we noted to the Curator and Assistant Curator that there was no mention of DoDDS schools in their exhibits. Our input was accepted, and we were thanked for bringing this to their attention. We hope that DoDEA schools will be added to their display.

As always, the AOSHS Board had a busy quarter and continues to further the work and the mission of AOSHS. It was wonderful to be recognized by DoDEA and by the Pentagon.

Please note: I am certain some of you are wondering how you might see the display recognizing DoDDS schools at the Pentagon. Unfortunately, unless you have an escort from the Pentagon or have access in some authorized way, it is not a display readily available to the public because of Pentagon security. We were not allowed to take our phones or any cameras into the Pentagon for the ceremony.



School Histories Update

We have posted histories for **over ninety percent** of the Department of Defense Schools overseas. Some of the histories are in-depth and many are very brief. Sadly, there are several schools that don't have any information other than an opening and closing date. As my term as historian is ending, I am seeking your help once again.

Many of the schools that don't have a history posted were only open for a short time in the early years of our program, and if we are unable to find information from the people who worked at or attended the schools, the school will just be a name on the list of schools. Please review the histories of the schools where you worked or attended and help me make your school live on. We are missing information on most of the elementary schools in France and early schools in the Pacific. The histories are located on our website, aoshs.org, under Collections and then School Histories.

Of the recent schools, we don't have any information on Narimasu Middle School in Japan, which was open in the seventies, or Rainbow Middle School in Germany, which was open from 1986 until 2015. We also need information on the early years of the Sullivans School in Japan and Sullivans Middle School.

The Year in Review

Each year the **AOSHS Board of Directors** reviews the work they have accomplished and prepares for the next year by defining their goals and determining who will be responsible for the actions necessary to achieve the year's work. The accomplishments are published in **Historical Book 1**. This year we decided to also publish our accomplishments in the *AOSHS Quarterly*.

AOSHS ACCOMPLISHMENTS 2022–2023

(September 2022—September 2023)

- Assisted DoDEA in a major project at the Pentagon by providing historical information and input into the development of a map depicting ALL DoD schools since 1907. The project included a large mural covering 143 linear feet, describing past and present aspects of the Department of Defense Education Activity.
- Increased funds in the **AOSHS Endowment Fund** to \$350,000.
- Increased **membership** to 1,249 members, representing a 22% increase.
- Increased the number of **yearbooks digitized** and placed online to over 4,300.
- Increased the number of **yearbook titles available** in the archive as either physical copies or PDFs to over 5,100 (Physical copies increased to over 3,700).
- Photographed and posted approximately 70,000 archive items on the website.
- Through continued outreach for memorabilia and memories about DoD schools, increased the number of items in the archives to over 200,000.
- Researched, wrote, and posted **school histories** for over 90% of the overseas schools on the website.
- Launched a successful initiative on **Facebook** in which the archivist posts artifacts each Friday highlighting five schools. In three months, 1,100 people were added to our Facebook membership, representing an increase of 14%. By the end of July 2023, AOSHS have over 8,500 Facebook members.

- Expanded the number of Virtual Remembrances posted on the website and continued to receive donations to those previously posted. AOSHS continues to promote the program by posting to several Facebook Groups.
- Developed a relationship with the National Museum of the United States Army to display information about teachers/administrators and students and their connections to the military. Establishing this connection to military-museums is a giant step toward expanding AOSHS's reach.
- Awarded six **Thomas Drysdale Memorial Scholarships** totaling \$9,000, which were funded by BRATS, educators, and alumni. The scholarships were awarded to two students from Kadena and one student each from Kinnick, Sigonella, Kaiserslautern, and Stuttgart. The scholarships for Kaiserslautern and Stuttgart were completely funded by alumni from those schools but managed via AOSHS.
- Produced and presented an updated video of the AOSHS headquarters and museum which was shown at the DoDDS Reunion and made available on the AOSHS website.
- Created awareness and support of AOSHS beyond our membership.

As you can see, we had a very busy year and hope 2023-2024 will be a year of growth and new endeavors.

KATHY EINHORN



Kathy Einhorn grew up in Salt Lake City, Utah after moving there in 1963 with her family. She earned a Bachelor of Science in

Special Education and Psychology with a minor in English from the University of Utah and started her teaching career as a teacher for 7th through 9th graders with Learning Disabilities and Behavior Disorders at Valley Junior High in West Valley, Utah.

Kathy moved to **Bamberg**, **West Germany** in 1986 with her military husband, Jeff, and two children, Jeff
Jr. and Jenny, where she became a
Special Education and English teacher at **Bamberg American Middle/High School**. She also coached girls' basketball and cheerleaders, helped develop the Honors English Program, and created the S.T.A.R.S. student recognition program.

The Einhorns left Germany in 1990 for Ft. Benning, Georgia, where Kathy taught elementary Special Education at Wilson Elementary and was assistant Special Education Director and Curriculum Director before accepting a position as an Instructional Systems Specialist in 2002 at the new DDESS Service Center in Peachtree City, Georgia. Kathy and Jeff moved to Guantanamo Bay, Cuba in 2007, where Kathy served as Principal for

W.T. Sampson Unit School while Jeff oversaw the Columbia College campus. Kathy retired from GTMO after 24 years of service in DoDEA in 2010 and became Principal at Trailside Elementary in Park City, Utah for four years, followed by serving as Assistant Superintendent for Teaching and Learning for four years in Park City. She retired in 2018 and has been working for Learning Sciences/Instructional Empowerment in a variety of projects. She currently works in a project on the Navajo Reservation in Arizona at Red Mesa and Kayenta Unified School Districts.

Kathy earned an MS in Learning Disabilities, an Ed Specialist in Administration and Supervision, and an Ed. D in Instructional Leadership over her career. Kathy and Jeff enjoyed being close to their children and grandchildren for eight years prior to Jeff's sudden passing in 2018. BUDDY LEAVITT



Buddy was born in Fort Lee, Virginia and grew up in Hopewell right outside the Army Base. Buddy's father was in the Army for 24




IN MEMORIAM

FRANKLIN "FRANK" DANIEL HILL

January 10, 1934 – October 19, 2023





Franklin Daniel Hill passed away on Thursday, October 19th, 2023, at his home in Shawnee, Oklahoma.

Frank was born on January 10th, 1934, the eighth child of Charles Daniel and Ollie Willow (Nichols). Frank attended numerous small rural schools throughout Seminole County, including Carr City, Hazel, and Pleasant Grove. He graduated from Pleasant Grove High School in 1952 and began attending Seminole Junior college (SJC).

He left SJC to join the US Army from 1953–1955 and served in the northeastern part of the US. Following his Army service, Frank earned a Bachelor of Science in 1957 from the then East Central State College, in Ada, Oklahoma. As a newly minted Math teacher, he moved west and taught in Compton, California for two years before returning and teaching at US Grant High School in Oklahoma City.

The year 1961 was a pivotal time in Frank's life because he decided to take an opportunity to become a teacher with DoDDS. His first assignment was in Ankara, Turkey; followed by Hahn and Wiesbaden, Germany; Rota, Spain; Karamürsel, Turkey; Peshawar, Pakistan; Weathersfield, England; Kadena and Kubasaki, Okinawa, Japan; Frankfurt, Germany; and finally, Wiesbaden, Germany. The positions he held included Math teacher, Assistant Principal, Principal, Secondary Coordinator, Chief of Executive Services, and District Superintendent (Hessen) before retiring in 1991 as Special Assistant to the Deputy Director of DoDDS. Along the way he earned a master's degree from the University of Oklahoma and completed the course work for a doctorate at the University of Southern California.

Following his retirement, Frank moved to a golf course in the Pacific Northwest for two years before moving to Shawnee in 1993 to be closer to his brothers and sister. Frank continued to travel in his retirement. He enjoyed spending time with friends from all over the world, skiing, playing tennis, renovating his home, and golfing with his brother Bryce and his local golf buddies at courses all over the state and beyond.
