BRAT Memories

Greg Alderete, former military BRAT who lived in Germany and Belgium.

If you ever lived on a U.S. military base in Germany during the Cold War, you know the truth: some of the most uniquely American experiences unfolded far from American soil. Halloween, of all things, became not just a celebration—but a spectacle.

We lived in "stairwells"—concrete apartment blocks housing up to 18 families each, stacked floor by floor like miniature vertical villages. Multiply that by dozens of buildings in every kaserne, and on October 31, those silent gray structures transformed into something out of pure fantasy.

At dusk, the magic began. Hordes of little goblins, ghosts, witches, stormtroopers, princesses, and pumpkin-headed beasts spilled out into the night. Pillowcases in hand, they moved in waves, from stairwell to stairwell, chasing candy and the thrill of the moment. Costumes ranged from store-bought PX classics to masterpieces sewn from ingenuity and imagination.

But it wasn't just about the costumes or the candy. Entire buildings went all in. Families worked together to create elaborate haunted graveyards on the lawns—cardboard tombstones and bloodsmeared warning signs, red lights casting eerie shadows, and hidden speakers howling like wolves from the trees. Figures lurked in the darkness—creatures rigged on pulleys, mannequins that sprang to life, and teenage volunteers in full ghoulish makeup who would leap out with a roar, sending shrieks echoing down the block. It was Halloween as immersive theater.

For us parents, there was a ritual of our own. We'd gather at the base of the stairwell, pooling our candy, handing it out by the bucketload, and pouring mugs of hot Glühwein —German mulled wine—for those thoughtful enough to bring their own cups. Neighbors chatted in a mix of English and German. Children laughed. Strangers became friends. For one night, duty and distance faded, and community took center stage.

There was something surreal about it all. Here we were, thousands of miles from home, living in a military outpost surrounded by foreign soil—and yet Halloween, of all things, anchored us. It reminded us of who we were and gave our kids something to hold on to. Our German neighbors often joined the celebration, intrigued by this loud, colorful American tradition playing out in the shadows of old European towns.

In hindsight, it was a small kind of diplomacy—this shared night of imagination and delight. A moment

where the rigid world of deployments and TDYs gave way to joy, creativity, and connection.

We didn't just bring Halloween to Germany. We built it from the ground up—in stairwells, parking lots, laundry rooms, and lawns turned into cemeteries. And in doing so, we gave our children a little magic to hold onto in a world defined by uniforms, orders, and temporary homes.

It was more than trick-o-treating. It was a memory that still howls in the dark, warmed by wine and wrapped in laughter.

AOSHS Archives Support National Military Museum

One of the Objectives of the **American Overseas Schools** Historical Society (AOSHS) is to promote and share the legacy and history of the **DoD schools** that got their state years ago in numerous locations around the world including the continental **United States**. It has always been a desire to provide a topquality museum that displays memorabilia and shares the past, present, and future of not only the school system but also the stories of the individuals that have participated in administering, teaching, or learning in the classrooms since **1946.** Today, this museum is in Wichita, Kansas.

Over the past two years, personal visits by the Board of Directors plus ongoing communications have taken place with the National Museum of the United

at Fort Belvoir, Virginia. This has been an interesting process of working with the administrators of an extremely large and relatively new facility that is the cornerstone of all 36 official Army museums around the globe. Our goal was to have some substantial presence in the museum.

And Now, AOSHS is proud to announce that WE ARE IN! To describe "our presence" may be a bit challenging. To start, in the very first section of the Army Museum is an exhibit that shares brief biographical information of outstanding soldiers/individuals who have done something significant in their lives for the U.S. Army. It consists of more than 50 free-standing pylons, in military style formation, with a photo and short story of the


individual etched on a block of stainless-steel measuring approximately seven feet high by two feet wide. It is an extremely impressive entry point to the massive museum.

AOSHS was asked to provide information about an important individual in the history of DoD schools. As our selectee, AOSHS has provided biographical information on Major Virgil Walker. In 1945, Major Walker was the individual chosen. through the direction of General Dwight D. Eisenhower, to start a school system that operated in occupied countries following World War II. General Eisenhower and his staff realized the importance of reuniting families with service members in these countries to support the mission. Schools were an integral part of this endeavor's success.



Even though it appears Major Walker's submission to the

museum to be a minor impact to the enormous size of the Army Museum, the museum leadership saw it as a starting point to the beginning of a larger exhibit about **DoDEA** schools. What we have provided has taken a great deal of research and numerous trials, but we are extremely proud of this first step.

Since the NMUSA is the central point of reference for all Army Museums in the world, we are expecting to share AOSHS stories and memorabilia with many other Army (and other service) museums around the world.


